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

# **BOARD**

# From the Chair

If 2017 was a year of steady strides down the pathway towards consolidating recent successful initiatives, particularly in the refinement of Board practices and in the restructuring of the internal organisation and staffing, 2018 has been a year of some leaps, some more steady strides, and some definite challenges.

Our first leap was a geographical one, with our Queensland Regional Art Awards (QRAA). For the first time, we launched the touring exhibition of the QRAA in Toowoomba, at the University of Southern Queensland (USQ), our major sponsors. Held at USQ Arts Gallery, *Iconic Queensland* artworks were displayed alongside their own fine collection. The warmth and success of this venture, generously hosted by USQ and eloquently opened by the Arts Minister, the Hon. Leeanne Enoch, has encouraged us to plan ambitiously for 2019. It also led to the appointment of a university 'champion' for Flying Arts Alliance, Associate Professor Margaret Baguley, who has also joined the Board.

Our biggest leap forward sounds neither momentous nor exciting, but it was both: progressing upgrades to our business systems. For years we have been 'making do', like a lot of Small to Medium not-for-profit organisations working with tight budgets, without significant allocations to support infrastructure building or replacement. During 2018 we put into place an ambitious fundraising scheme to support our very necessary infrastructure improvements. We secured full funding to completely reboot us, as it were, with a contemporary business system that will reduce staff hours spent on basic administrative tasks to make way for greater capacity building and creative initiatives. Board members Kasia Kondas and Gabriella Ritchie oversaw the commissioning process alongside CEO Kerryanne Farrer and Operations Lead Paul Thompson. The system will be rolled out throughout 2019.

Flying Arts also made a considerable leap forward in being selected by Regional Arts Australia, on behalf of the Australian Government, as the Regional Arts Fund's (RAF) Administrator in Queensland. The program not only utilises our excellent regional and remote networks built up over so many years, but gives us the opportunity to make many more new contacts among innovative and emerging artists as they seek RAF funding.

Continued steady strides in funding and sponsorship included cementing a new relationship with Australia-wide law firm Holding Redlich. Holding Redlich's appreciation of the importance of the arts has lead in the past to long-term 'flagship' partnerships in Sydney and Melbourne – and now in Queensland with Flying Arts. Holding Redlich put their support behind the major prize for the Queensland Regional Art Awards and will support its touring outcome in 2019.

The generous support of our loyal 500 Club donor circle and Art for Life personal donors has been rewarded by Creative Partnerships Australia, who for a period in 2019 will match all donations dollar for dollar.

As Chair, I am proud of the exceptional efforts of our Board, including our Development Committee led by Mary-Louise North and Wendy Brooks, and the Flying Arts staff who collaborated on both fundraising and economising in operations throughout 2018 to overcome a significant challenge. In 2017 we put in place an essential development and

fundraising initiative, including a consultancy and a new staff position. During the year we realised that the revenue we had forecast for this was over-optimistic within the short-term, because such initiatives inevitably have to grow organically, often with long timelines. Under the CEO and the Treasurer's wise guidance, our dedicated staff responded admirably to recover and avert potential crisis. As a result, 2018 ended with only a small deficit, which we confidently expect to recoup in 2019, as the results of the Development and Fundraising initiative are indeed beginning to flow in.

Artistic, elegant surroundings became a theme for our 2018 special events, with fundraisers generously hosted by supporters in beautiful settings. Beginning with a fine traditional Australian collection in Carmel Dyer and Allen Hunter's sumptuous period home, 'Toonarbin' in West End, special events also included a presentation of contemporary Queensland artist Simon de Groot at the Jan Manton Gallery, and a triumphant show of new works by Merv Moriarty at Mitchell Fine Art. Merv Moriarty's exhibition will tour Queensland with a clever creative twist to bring local artists out of the woodwork. Titled *Colour and Response*, the regional galleries will exhibit Merv's exhibition, *Colour II*, alongside a locally curated exhibition responding to Merv's works and drawing on the legacy of Flying Arts.

Following the 2017 Review, the Board continued to refine and reshape its practices throughout 2018. The Reviewer's recommendations are in place. The Board established the Audit Committee and participated in a training and consolidation retreat. In planned successions, there were two resignations at the AGM and three appointments. The first was the Treasurer, Nick Gregory, whose place was seamlessly taken by Andy Stephanos. Andy Stephanos had been the organisation's finance officer for a decade and had further demonstrated his electability to the Board by founding the 500 Club as its first donor. Dr Rebecca Scollen was replaced by our new USQ 'champion' Assoc. Prof. Baguley, who is continuing to work with Dr Scollen and the Chair of the Board on some promising research initiatives. In addition, we welcomed our first Indigenous Board member, Michelle Tuahine, who brings strong media skills as well as a rich knowledge base of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander networks and understandings. Ms Tuahine's leadership contributes to further diversify Flying Arts's vision, offerings and delivery and her appointment is a significant stride forward for the organisation.

We can look forward confidently to 2019, with a strong profile; a full schedule; dazzling success ratings for our programs and projects; a talented line-up of artists, staff members and volunteers to carry them out; balanced books; and the prospect of a whole new dawn of efficient practice as the new business system kicks in.

# **EXECUTIVE OFFICER**

# 2018 in Summary

2018 has been a year of growth for Flying Arts Alliance in terms of resources and programs, with the view to 'securing our future' for years to come. Two important functions have been added to our business. Firstly, we have embedded development as core business through the addition of a dedicated staff member to lead our fundraising initiative. Secondly we took on the responsibility of administering the Regional Arts Fund (RAF) in Queensland, and staffing this accordingly.

In this new role of Regional Program Administrator of the RAF, Flying Arts attended the Regional Arts Australia conference in Bendigo Victoria, to connect and strengthen our place in the national regional arts conversation and policy development.

Flying Arts also leant its support to a number of submissions for the newly formed Regional Arts Services Network (RASN). While not directly engaged in RASN, we continue to support this state wide initiative of the Queensland Government to ensure regional arts is resourced to strengthen our sector overall.

At the office, we started the year with a compliment of 6.2 FTE staff, with Paul Thompson, Kat Johnston and Andy Stephanos, continuing as longer-term staff in Operations, Marketing and Finance roles respectively. They were supported in administration by relative newcomer, Amy Cook. Our programming team of Maya Carter-Malins and Jess Cuddihy were joined by Maddie Cook (no relation to Amy!) in the Exhibitions, Scheduled and By Request portfolios. Karen Plitt continued in the fledgling role of Development. In the second half of the year, we were able to increase our overall resource to 6.6 FTE, by extending Administration to encompass the RAF.

In the last few months of 2018, our little light 'art craft' experienced a spot of turbulence, in the most unexpected and unrelated turnover of our programming team. We were relatively unscathed thanks to our experienced staff who kept things steady during the transition. We now have a new vibrant and experienced cohort in charge of programming - Lisa Beilby in Exhibitions, Julie Robson in Scheduled Programs and Tallara Gray in By Request Programs. They took to their roles with gusto! While this meant a very challenging end to our year, overall morale remained high and output continued strongly. I wish to congratulate the team for the extraordinary effort they individually and collectively contributed to get us to the landing strip at the end of 2018.

We are well into our four-year cycle of core organisational funding from our State Government partner Arts Queensland; and our three years of capacity funding from our major philanthropic partner, the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation. We are most grateful to both bodies for their ongoing support, financial assistance, and valuable expertise. Their holistic support has allowed Flying Arts to spread its wings and think big in the arenas of fundraising and business innovation.

This year we embarked on a new fundraising initiative through the Australian Cultural Fund (ACF) crowdfunding platform. The ACF was able to offer matched funding for the first \$2,000 raised. Through this platform we raised over \$6,000 providing much needed support to our overall operations. This gave us the confidence to successfully apply for Creative

Partnerships Australia's Plus 1 funding, to run a more ambitious fundraising campaign in 2019.

We also sought the best fit tool for updating and integrating our business systems. We will engage a consultant in 2019 to implement a Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system and address our critical issue of inefficiencies in handling and cross-referencing data. At the heart of this drive to innovate our business is the people we are here to serve, to ensure we understand how individuals and groups interact with Flying Arts and how we can better meet the needs of our constituents in the future. This is exciting but also challenging, which is why we have spent the best part of 2018 doing our research and due diligence. We can now confidently go forward into the next phase of this essential business transformation.

Our current home at the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts is undergoing a major main entrance facelift. As a result, we lost access to the gallery space that we have regularly used to showcase regional artists in a variety of exhibitions, including the touring exhibition of the Queensland Regional Art Awards. To ensure we retained visibility in "the Judy", we embarked upon presenting seasonal plinth exhibitions in the foyer spaces and branched out to other gallery spaces both in Brisbane and Toowoomba. Flying Arts continues to ensure we are playing our part to provide regional artists with opportunities to exhibit in metropolitan areas.

With the arrival of new tenants at the Judith Wright Centre, our access to other spaces for workshops has been reduced. We trialled a number of alternative venue solutions. As a result, we presented our popular Exhibition Development Program at the TAFE Queensland Southbank campus. This potentially opens the door for further use of this facility for weekend programs in 2019.

A change of the guard at our university partner required us to present a renewed business case for Flying Arts to the University of Southern Queensland (USQ). We held our major event, the launch of Iconic Queensland, the touring exhibition of the 2017 Queensland Regional Art Awards, at the USQ Arts Gallery, and presented key programming initiatives on campus in Toowoomba and Springfield.

We continue to explore new ways to diversify our engagement with remote and rural communities. I had the wonderful privilege of travelling to Thursday Island at the invitation of the Torres Strait Regional Authority to present at their Arts and Cultural forum. This paved the way for three workshops through our By Request Program at Bamaga and on Moa and Thursday Islands in 2018. This was just one example of many remote, rural and regional programs we delivered throughout the year.

This year our Small Schools Program was shifted into a fund format. All schools with 50 or fewer students could apply to the fund for cross-curriculum arts rich projects, providing a greater opportunity for projects to be delivered in schools with the highest need. We received 25 applications, and ultimately delivered six projects to eight school groups in 2018. The response to the fund and success of the resulting projects is a clear demonstration of the significant demand that exists for programs that support the national curriculum, and the entitlement of all children to have an education inclusive of the arts. We identified Small Schools as

a strategic program of high impact and sought resources to continue its delivery. We successfully applied for funding from Gandel Philanthropy to further support our Small Schools Fund in 2019.

Our exhibition program continually looks for opportunities to increase engagement, capacity building and professional development of artists, artsworkers and for the communities it reaches. After three years on the road, *Reminiscence: A Tribute to Judith Wright*, our first exhibition to receive the Queensland Government's Playing Queensland Funding, finished its tour. We were successful in a new application to the same fund to support our *Colour and Response* exhibition and public programs, which will enable richly enduring connections in five regional locations. In 2018, curatorial mentorship programs were delivered to prepare local exhibitions in 'response' to the legacy of Flying Arts. These response exhibitions will be shown alongside the *Colour II* exhibition by Flying Arts founder, Mervyn Moriarty in Texas, Dalby, Bundaberg, Roma and Gladstone from 2019 - 2020.

In 2018, we embarked on plans to tour *Jabu Birriny* (Land + Sea) an exhibition of works by indigenous artists from Yarrabah, developed by State Library of Queensland. We will offer a cultural public program in 2019 and 2020, pending funding.

As a small to medium, not-for-profit arts organisation, Flying Arts is lucky to have some very talented administrators in our crew, and most of their brilliance shows itself behind the scenes. This year, our amazing team managed numerous exceptional operational and programming manoeuvres, demonstrating resilience and ingenuity. I applaud their efforts.

As CEO, I have been buoyed by the outstanding encouragement and expertise, given in abundance by the Board of Flying Arts Alliance. My sincere thanks to one and all.

Thank you also to our touring team, who are our "brand ambassadors" in the field, and to all the facilitators who lead workshops, consultations and programs on our behalf. Brayo... encore!

# CREATIVE COMMUNITIES AND SCHOOLS By Request Programs



## **WORKSHOPS AND PROJECTS**

The Flying Arts By Request Program has been at the core of the organisation's deliverables for 47 years. Through this program, workshops and projects are available on-demand, and can be booked on behalf of schools and creative communities such as groups, festivals, local government and organisations. Workshops and projects across the broad categories of visual arts, arts business and arts management were delivered across Queensland.

In 2018, Flying Arts' skilled Touring Team of 50 artists and arts business facilitators delivered 147 programmed activities in 187 training days across 86 unique locations.

From batik workshops in the Torres Strait, to silversmithing in Cloncurry and Tie Dye in Roma – the team have delivered fresh ideas and assisted creatives across rural and remote Queensland in a wide range of subject matters and mediums. Flying Arts also worked with several metropolitan clients, mostly schools, to deliver specialist art workshops and projects to students.

The encouraging feedback that Flying Arts receives about its By Request Program illustrates the calibre of our Touring Team, with participants and clients rating their satisfaction at 98% good to excellent.

# CASE STUDY: SILVERSMITHING IN MT ISA

Each year, Clare Poppi makes the long journey to the same school in Mt Isa to teach silversmithing to the 11 and 12 visual art students. In 2018 the students learnt how to size, solder, shape and polish rings, and other general silversmithing techniques including riveting, saw-piercing, texturing, filing and finishing.

The students learned specialist techniques which are not commonly available to most high school students in regional Queensland. While silversmithing classes are available but expensive in metropolitan areas, they and are relatively non-existent in regional areas without a silversmithing club or lapidary group close by. The participants remark how much they enjoy Clare visiting each year as they are able to improve their skills and learn more, and have continuity in their learning year to year. Each time Clare returns, she develops a stronger relationship with the community, the students and the school, which is really important for everyone involved.

# CASE STUDY: ARTS MARKETING IN REDCLIFFE

Redcliffe Art Society utilised the expertise of Flying Arts Touring Team to deliver arts marketing workshops to their volunteers at the Old Fire Station Gallery, Redcliffe. They discussed publicity and marketing, with an emphasis on print and social media for the gallery and their associated gallery shop.

Cara McCullough delivered one of these workshops, with a focus on website development. She showed participants how marketing has changed, what works in today's digital age, and how to access useful technology to enhance usability and performance as well as save time. Redcliffe Art Society plans on engaging Flying Arts further in 2019 to extend on the industry knowledge of its volunteers.



# CASE STUDY: BATIK, WEAVING AND PRINTING IN THE TORRES STRAIT

Flying Arts was engaged by Torres Strait Regional Authority to run a series of workshops in batik, weaving and printing at Gab Titui Cultural Centre on Thursday Island. Artists from Thursday Island, plus the surrounding islands of Hammond and Badu, the remote island of Erub, as well as Bamaga on the mainland attended the workshop.

Touring Team artist Scott Maxwell, who facilitated the batik workshop enjoyed encouraging the participants to be fluid and flowing in their designs, as they let the tjanting make the marks rather than a pen or brush. By the second day most students had abandoned the rigidness and constraints of the ubiquitous pencil and allowed the creative mind and dexterity of hand to apply hot wax in fluid designs. The workshop was very productive. The artists finished with an average of four large artworks each and expressed a strong desire to create more. At the end of the workshop, the participants were keen do more batik.

This year, our Small Schools Program shifted to a fund format, allowing any small school with 50 or fewer students across regional and remote Queensland to apply for up to \$5,000 per year for cross-curriculum visual arts projects. This format opened the opportunity to a wider number of schools and allowed Flying Arts to provide fully-subsidised workshops and projects in the schools that demonstrated the greatest need for support.

In 2018, Flying Arts received 25 applications from schools across the state. 5 facilitators from the Touring Team delivered multi-day arts experiences involving 178 students from 8 participating schools. Completed projects provided benefits for teaching staff, students, and the wider community. Many schools utilised the opportunity to facilitate outreach to establish and strengthen connection, engagement and partnerships with organisations in their local communities.

Flying Arts provided teachers with online case studies and sample lesson plans produced from successful workshops. This accessible resource has proven useful for teachers who are exploring cross-curriculum outcomes within their own classrooms and communities.

In 2018, the Small Schools Fund received the generous support of Gandel Philanthropy to expand the funding pool to enable a greater number of schools to participate in the 2019 program.

The Small Schools Fund is an ongoing outcome of the Connecting Arts with School Curriculum research project pilot project run in collaboration with the University of Southern Queensland.

# CASE STUDY: RAVENSWOOD STATE SCHOOL

Year level: Prep - Year 6 Number of students: 24

Cross curriculum links: Visual Art/Humanities and Social Science (HASS)

In preparation for the community of Ravenswood's 150th anniversary celebrations, the local primary school was tasked with creating colourful artworks featuring iconic elements of the township. The best of these artworks were included as illustrations for a commemorative book celebrating Ravenswood's 150 years of settlement and community.

Flying Arts teaching artist, Lee Fullarton, was embraced by the school and community for three full days of workshops where students learnt innovative painting, drawing and collage methods. Imagery was drawn from reflections and investigations of the townships iconic history, heritage, landscape, objects, people and places, both past and present.

The program concluded with the family, friends, teachers and students all coming together to view the exhibition of works created by the students during the previous three days. This portfolio of artwork was used to select images for the book, published with assistance of Carpentaria Gold and the local restoration and preservation society.

# CASE STUDY: AVONDALE STATE SCHOOL

Year level: Prep - Year 6 Number of students: 10

Cross curriculum links: Visual Arts/Science

Inspired by scientific exploration processes, students from Avondale State School welcomed Flying Arts artist, Kayako (Kay) Watanabe to collaborate with the teacher to plan and facilitate a lesson on how to record their observations artistically.

After learning about insects in Science, students were encouraged to apply their scientific knowledge to designs suitable for printmaking.

12 students at Avondale State School participated in a variety of printmaking activities centered on (but not limited to) the theme of "bugs".

They made plates and printed them by hand and also with a flatbed printing press. All students made collographic prints and the older students also produced a paper dry point etching. Students manipulated some prints, prepared them for display and reflected, in writing, on their experiences.



It was fantastic watching a teaching artist working with the children in creating artwork signifying our historical town. The portfolio of work from each child displayed huge improvement in their skills and artwork across the three days.



# QUEENSLAND REGIONAL ART AWARDS Wanderlust

In recognition of a state that inspires exploration, this year's theme for the Queensland Regional Art Awards was 'Wanderlust'. Flying Arts asked artists to embrace a spirit of adventure and discover something unique about their own community or one that they visited within the state, to produce works that reflected their diverse Queensland communities.

170 Artworks were submitted to the awards this year from across Queensland. The awards also attracted over 2,000 votes for People's Choice through an online gallery which displayed all submitted artworks.

This year, 8 regional Queensland artists have shared in a \$25,000 prize pool.

A total of 26 artworks were selected to tour in the *Wanderlust* exhibition, curated by Acimovic. The exhibition, supported by Holding Redlich, will tour to Brisbane and a number of regional centres in 2019 and 2020, including Somerset, Winton, Goondiwindi, Chinchilla, Toowoomba, and Ingham.



# GROUNDED [FREUMHAICHTE | WADLU-GNANA] JUDITH PARROTT

In 2018, *Grounded* visited two regional locations and finished its tour. This exhibition has been a huge success since it started touring in 2015.

The exhibition presented the outcome of two residencies by artist Judith Parrott: one in the Gaelic speaking Outer Hebrides of Scotland and the other with the Australian Aboriginal nations of the Central Australian desert and the plains of Western Queensland.

Grounded featured photography, sound, audiovisual, language and prose; with inspiration drawn from landscape and stories shared by the local people. Judith's artistic interpretation addresses issues surrounding connection to land, language, and each other for environmental and personal wellbeing.

In 2018, 940 visitors attended the exhibition. During its four years of touring, over 12,000 audience members in regional Queensland have enjoyed Judy Parrott's *Grounded*.

# REMINISCENCE: A TRIBUTE TO JUDITH WRIGHT

Reminiscence: A Tribute to Judith Wright concluded its tour in 2018, visiting an additional two venues across regional Queensland.

The exhibition, *Reminiscence*, featured the works of artists Fiona Rafferty and Frances Smith, who worked collaboratively to produce works on paper and ceramics celebrating Queensland's own poet and activist Judith Wright; a fiercely intelligent, strong and passionate woman who cared deeply about the land of her birth and the first people of her beloved country, Australia.

In 2018, *Reminiscence* attracted 1,094 gallery visitors and public programs presented in conjunction with the exhibition engaged a further 172 participants. To date, the exhibition has attracted a total of 11,606 visitors and almost 600 participants.

## **COLOURS OF QUEENSLAND**

The *Colours of Queensland* exhibition, an outcome of the 2016 Queensland Regional Art Awards, completed its tour in Goondiwindi this year.

## **ICONIC QUEENSLAND**

The *Iconic Queensland* exhibition was the outcome of the 2017 Queensland Regional Art Awards.

Queensland is rich with iconic structures, people, locations, events and lifestyles that shape the state's identity. Artists were invited to consider the unique and iconic elements within their own regions, to produce works that reflect our diverse Queensland communities.

29 artworks were chosen to tour metropolitan and regional Queensland in 2018.

The major launch of *Iconic Queensland* was, for the first time, held in a regional location rather than Brisbane. On 17 March, *Iconic Queensland* was officially opened by Arts Minister, the Hon. Leeanne Enoch at USQ Arts Gallery, Toowoomba to 80 guests and exhibiting artists.

During the tour, 4,256 audience members viewed the exhibition and 134 community members participated in public programs associated with the exhibition. This exhibition will continue to tour into 2019.

# **COLOUR AND RESPONSE PROJECT**

Colour and Response was developed following the success of Moriarty's retrospective exhibition Colour: Mervyn Moriarty, A Retrospective Exhibition which was held in Brisbane in 2016 to commemorate the 45th Anniversary of Flying Arts. The exhibition and its associated public programs captured many stories of artists' careers that have been inspired and developed as a direct result of Moriarty's legacy. Colour and Response allows Flying Arts to put the spotlight on the regions to unearth more of these stories.

Flying Arts successfully obtained Queensland Government funding to support this project through the Playing Queensland Fund.



## **Growth in Partnerships**

We extend a warm welcome to our newest Queensland Regional Art Awards (QRAA) Exhibition Touring Partner and Major Art for Life Award co-Sponsor, Holding Redlich. Their support will ensure that the QRAA continues to grow as an important event on the Queensland arts calendar.

Welcome and thanks to Gandel Philanthropy who have come on board as an important and generous partner supporting our Small Schools Fund. Their contribution will help us provide additional fully-subsidised arts experiences in rural and remote schools with 50 students or fewer in 2019.

## **Leveraging Social Media**

Flying Arts delved into new fundraising territory through the Australian Cultural Fund (ACF) platform. We successfully applied to Creative Partnerships "Boost" program which enabled us to receive matched funding of up to \$2,000 on our fundraising efforts through the ACF portal. We set a goal of raising \$2,000 to be matched dollar for dollar to build organisational capacity, which is so important for not-for-profit organisations. We exceeded our goal and raised over \$6,000 in total. The initiative had the added benefit of raising the profile of Flying Arts to new audiences with almost 3,000 page views of our campaign.

#### **Art for Life Giving Fund**

Our Art For Life Giving Fund is our primary annual giving program to attract general community support. Donations raised through this fund supported our programmed activities for young people, artists and educators.

# **REGIONAL ARTS FUND**

2018

July saw Flying Arts Alliance take on the administration of the Regional Arts Fund (RAF), which was administered by Arts Queensland in the interim after the close of Artslink Queensland.

Provided through Regional Arts Australia (RAA), the Regional Arts Fund is an Australian Government program designed to benefit regional and remote arts practitioners, artsworkers, audiences and communities.

RAF supports and promotes participation in, and access to, Australia's arts and culture in regional and remote Australia by:

- Encouraging and supporting sustainable economic, social and cultural development in regional communities
- Developing partnerships and networks which leverage financial and/or in-kind support for specific projects and encourage ongoing
- Developing audiences and broadening community engagement with the arts
- Increasing employment and professional development opportunities for, and raising the profile of, regional and remote artists

In 2018 Flying Arts administered three streams of funding: Quick Response Grants (QRGs); Community Project Grants (CPGs); and a special round of funding to facilitate travel for regional artists and artsworkers to Artlands 2018 in Bendigo, Victoria.

CEO Kerryanne Farrer and RAF Administrator Amy Cook were also able to attend *Artlands* on behalf of Flying Arts, to exchange insights about regional Australia's creative community, and to attend RAA state administrator meetings. Flying Arts also hosted and promoted an informal breakfast attend by over 40 Queensland delegates.

As Flying Arts commenced administration of the RAF in July, we oversaw one round of funding in 2018.

## **ARTLANDS TRAVEL SUBSIDIES**

A special funding round was provided to subsidise travel for artists and artsworkers in regional and remote Queensland to attend Regional Arts Australia's biennial conference, Artlands, held in Bendigo, Victoria in 2018. 11 applications were received, and 8 were approved.

## **COMMUNITY PROJECT GRANT RECIPIENTS**

Community Project Grants offered up to \$30,000 for applications which benefit the community, increase access and participation, and/or provide direct benefits to artists and artsworkers.

36 Community Project Grant applications were submitted, the highest number on record for a Queensland Regional Arts Fund Community Project Grant round. Of these, the peer assessment panel assessed 24, approved 5 for funding, and offered partial funding for one more, bringing the total projects funded to 6. Approved projects ranged from Channel Country in the far west to Mapoon in Cape York and Maryborough in Wide Bay.

## **QUICK RESPONSE GRANT RECIPIENTS**

Quick Response Grants offered up to \$3,000 per application for regional and remote artists and arts workers to undertake professional development opportunities or fund smaller projects. During this round, 29 Quick Response Grant applications were received, and 18 were approved for funding.

These ranged from \$1,404 to the maximum amount of \$3,000, and spanned disciplines from playwriting and street performance to professional development opportunities and the recording of traditional cultural practices. 12 projects took place in Queensland, with a further 4 interstate and 2 overseas.
