



BOARD

From the Chair

Unlike 2018, 2019 was not a year of leaps and bounds (except one), but a solid year of consolidation, positive, measured development, and careful change management. The biggest achievement of all categories was internal, embodied in the long-awaited change from manual, almost horse-drawn, office practices to a contemporary CRM (Customer Relations Management) system. The negotiations for this and then its embedding, installing and training has taken Board and staff all year, and imposed a considerable extra load on all - undertaken willingly and with some relief, and already a growing satisfaction as the new system starts to deliver major savings in efficiency.

The first commendation must go to the CEO and staff. Now settled comfortably into the more autonomous leadership structure and roles created in 2018, and with little staff movement, they have shown wholehearted commitment and initiative. Two examples of this, apart from rising to the challenge of the CRM with aplomb, were a.) really putting our money where our mouth is, and transporting our Queensland Regional Art Award Launch to Winton; and b.) embracing opportunities ahead with our impending 50th Anniversary in 2021. The first - this year's leap and bound - was a triumph of art, collaboration and logistics. From the local Winton community throwing us a magnificent welcome, to the seamless organisation by their staff and ours, to the extraordinary generosity of our sponsors and 500 Club members — many of whom came for the ride - including most of the Board and the indefatigable Tim and Gina Fairfax who themselves flew several of the Board members up there and took part in everything. For the second, the 50th, the staff has not (as they might have) viewed the extra commitment with apprehension, but actively sought involvement with the Board's working party, and are helping to conceptualise the celebration, envisaging initiatives to share it among Queensland's regional communities, and simultaneously enhance our own delivery of memorable art state-wide.

We continue to increase our faithful sponsors, even as the national climate for arts funding continues to change (rapidly cooling) with more stress on vulnerable and imperilled species, especially in the light of the federal Government's extraordinary decision to drop Arts from its ministry. We have maintained our position as the Queensland Administrator of the Australian Government's Regional Arts Fund, and even achieved an increase in strategic project funding to promote the fund to regional and remote communities. We are grateful for the continued staunch support of the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland as our main funding partner, Arts Queensland even gave us supplementary assistance to help cover the unexpected shortfall when a long-term sponsorship fell through.

New grants include a welcome grant from Playing Queensland Fund (PQF), to help us achieve a long-held ambition, and to provide complementary events such as artists talks and workshops to support our touring exhibitions. This is essential so that we may be Flying, but we are not *fly-in-fly-out* Arts. An earlier PQF grant is already operative in the current *Colour and Response* touring of Merv Moriarty's new work (and the local artistic community's responses to it), and this latest is for our forthcoming *Jabu Birriny* (*Land + Sea*) touring exhibition.

We also received generous funding from Gandel Philanthropy for our popular *Small Schools* program. We combined this with a vigorous campaign resulting in generous individual donations and matched funding from Creative Partnerships Australia. Together, they allowed us to double the number of remote schools with under fifty students, where we were able to give the students and teachers the Flying Arts experience of a visiting artist on a curriculum topic of the school's choosing. We accompanied these school visits with a research project, organised by the Board in conjunction with the University of Southern Queensland (USQ). Our program of fundraising visits to the homes of art patrons continued with a dazzling evening generously hosted by 500 Club donors.

Sadly, our long-term relationship with USQ ended this year, partly due to financial exigencies imposed on Universities, and partly to problems of timing in both organisations that prevented a new productive partnership from being struck. The Board is keeping the USQ door open and, meanwhile, pro-actively investigating relationships with other tertiary institutions. We are already engaged in a valuable partnership with TAFE Queensland, involving space and premises at South Bank and regional campuses in future.

The Board, led by ex-Board member Nikki Acconero and our indefatigable CEO, has played an active role in developing an exciting new Strategic Plan for 2021-24. There has been a little movement on the Board, both in and – all because of external exigencies - out. Wendy Brooks' family and work commitments in Melbourne have forced her to leave the Board, but not before putting in place our healthy development program at Board and staff level and snaring us some valuable sponsorships. Marg O'Donnell, former Queensland Director General of the Arts, and Nadeyn Barbieri from QUT Philanthropy Division both had a brief but very productive sojourn as Board members before overwhelming professional commitments forced their departure too.

Other collaborations are alive and evolving. Flying Arts is playing a key role in leading the development of a proposed Queensland Chamber of Arts and Culture, and hosted a consultancy, funded again by Arts Queensland and led by Sandra Fields of Fieldworx, to scope the value, the framework and business plan. Our burgeoning Art Enquirer program for encouraging young people to write about art was a collaboration between Flying Arts and our neighbours the IMA (Institute of Modern Art) and produced an outstanding crop of youthful and talented art critics. Our Connecting Art with School Curriculum program has now morphed in with our successful Webinar program.

Overall our program numbers continue increasing, our reserves remain healthy, and our customers' satisfaction ratings remain stratospheric. We look forward to 2020 – and beyond – in good shape.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER

2019 in Summary

2019 has been a year of consolidating the groundwork and growth of 2018 in our ongoing aim to "secure the future" of Flying Arts Alliance as we inch closer to our 50th year in 2021 with our eye on the horizon of the next 50 years and beyond.

Our largest project for 2019 has been to find and engage a suitable consultant to implement a business system upgrade to Salesforce, a powerful Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system. This is a huge undertaking, but with the expert guidance of the Board we decided on a Brisbane based company with excellent Salesforce credentials and we have been impressed with what has been achieved, with the bulk of the build completed.

This aptly named "Project Dreamliner" will be transformational for Flying Arts in terms of administrative efficiency and effectiveness, improving how we communicate with, and better serve our valued artists, members, customers, partners, donors and stakeholders. The success to date is largely the work of a threesome comprising of staff member Paul Thompson, who has dedicated his time and skill to fully embrace the technology and learn exponentially on the job; Change Management Consultant, Kasia Kondas, who is also a Board member; both of whom have worked closely with me to keep this project airborne until it arrives at "go-live" in April 2020.

Another success factor this year has been the current staff cohort at the end of 2019, who for the first time since I have been CEO, have been the same team that started the year, namely Julie Robson, Lisa Beilby, Tallara Gray, Karen Plitt, Amy Cook, Kat Johnston and Paul Thompson. This is testament to their skill and experience, as well as an overall willingness to embrace the values and goals of the organisation, as well as trust the change journey that we are on. Each team member brings something different, but they all share a common desire to serve our constituents.

We are in transition in the Finance Officer position from our long-time stalwart of the numbers, Andy Stephanos. Andy, has stepped into the role of treasurer and has been able to handover Finance Officer duties to Cara Hughes, who has specialised in financials for arts organisations for several years.

Additionally, due to several successful project grant applications, we have had invaluable support to our programs from contractors in administration (Jacky Burkett), public relations and marketing (Odette Miller), and project support (Emma Che Raethke).

This year, Flying Arts continued to support the visual arts sector across Queensland through our programs and services. We don't exist in a visual arts bubble however, and have continued our support and development of all art forms through our professional development and cross curriculum collaboration work for artist, arts workers and educators.

More recently we have been able to achieve this goal through the administration of the Australian Government's Regional Arts Fund, which is a vital part of the funding opportunities available for those living and working regional and remote Queensland.

With additional strategic funding support, our staff have been able to

connect with several communities to speak to individuals and organisations about the opportunities that this fund provides to regional arts.

We have also connected with the Regional Arts Services network and other key regional arts service providers in numerous ways, from information sharing to project support, and we look forward to continuing this valuable connection to artsworkers on the ground in communities.

The first regional arts conference since 2013, Arts Ablaze, was held in 2019 at Kooralbyn, hosted by Scenic Rim Regional Council. 27 presenters and participants from remote and regional Queensland were assisted to attend with quick response grants provided through the Regional Arts Fund, which is administered in Queensland by Flying Arts Alliance.

We continue to maintain balance of diverse income sources to keep us financially viable. It is a constant juggle for small-to-medium not for profit (or perhaps more accurately, profit for purpose!) arts organisations. We are grateful for both the funding support and positive relationship with our key government funders Arts Queensland, having successfully completed the third year of our current four-year funding cycle, exceeding all our funding KPIs, and, of equal importance, demonstrating impact to individuals and community in many ways.

Our relationship with our major philanthropic partner, Tim Fairfax Family Foundation, remains strong as we complete our second year of three years of capacity funding in the program and development areas. This has given us confidence and the runs on the board to leverage other philanthropic support for Flying Arts' programs and organisational capacity, for which we are very grateful.

Our private and corporate giving is on the rise with our focus on the future and building our base of engaged supporters. The most significant area of private giving is from our circle of 500 Club donors, who have been instrumental in the success of our fundraising campaigns. Most notable is this year's *Make Art Big in Small Schools* campaign. Having a staff resource, a dedicated board development committee and board advocates have been all critical to this still relatively new area of our business.

The Queensland Government's Playing Queensland Fund has been instrumental in deepening our engagement with remote and regional communities through our exhibition program. Our corporate support from Holding Redlich has not only maintained the major art prize of the Queensland Regional Art Awards, but enabled exhibition installation and educational support of the touring exhibition.

A new one-off grant from the Queensland Community Foundation for capacity building to engage a consultant, Wavelength, to design tools and training for our staff in evaluation frameworks to measure our impact was started late in 2019 will be rolled out through 2020.

There were many program highlights this year, which are elaborated on in the rest of the annual report, however a few deserve a special mention.



Two very different exhibitions events were on the Flying Arts calendar this year. One was in the outback centre of Winton for the regional launch of *Wanderlust*, the touring exhibition of the 2018 Queensland Regional Art Awards. This was both a challenge and an achievement for all involved, thanks to the support of the Winton Shire Council and the Waltzing Matilda Centre. The second event was a donor circle event in a private home focused firmly on art and building support. We need both types of events as we build our relationships across the state and in Brisbane.

Our tertiary partnerships have added new dimensions to our programs in 2019. These include pilot projects on several campuses. Our webinars were enhanced both in quality and outreach—through USQ film studios. USQ also hosted a 'Where to Next...?' mid-career intensive at their Springfield campus. USQ is also managing a joint research program into the impact of our Small Schools Program. Weekend workshops and exhibition development program for artists were held at TAFE Southbank campus. QCA Galleries accepted artist Bec Lewis' proposal for a solo exhibition at their project gallery, and we were notified that QRAA State of Diversity was accepted for exhibition at QCA's POP Gallery in early 2020. These are incredibly valuable connections to make with higher education for our members and participants.

It is therefore very much because of a team effort across all levels of the organisation, from the staff in particular, and from the board, that we can say 2019 was a success.

Last, but not least, it is our artists who are out there in the field, rising daily to the challenge of sustaining an arts practice, whether it is through studio practice, study, teaching, sharing; our art educators who are on the front line, continuing to inspire the next generations of artists, art lovers and, in a holistic way, humans; and the arts workers who manage the paperwork, the committees, the bureaucracies to enable artists and communities to thrive, we applaud you! You are why we do what we do!

WORKSHOPS AND PROJECTS

The Flying Arts By Request Program offers workshops and programs ondemand, and can be booked on behalf of schools and creative communities such as groups, festivals, local government and organisations. Workshops and projects across the broad categories of visual arts, arts business and arts management were delivered across Queensland. This has been the core of Flying Arts business for 48 years.

In 2019, the Touring Team grew to 58 facilitators from across Queensland with a variety of specialties. Arts business and management workshops have been particularly popular this year, with many arts communities seeking professional development for adult participants. Schools have also been a large part of the By Request portfolio's deliverables again in 2019, with schools forming 57% of clients.

This year, the By Request and Exhibitions portfolio launched a new joint initiative to allow venues hosting Flying Arts exhibitions to book exhibiting artists for related public programs. The first of these saw QRAA winner Erin Dunne travel to Winton for an artist talk and to facilitate an all-ages experimental drawing workshop for the community. This model was well received, and Flying Arts will continue this format into 2020.

The encouraging feedback that Flying Arts receives about its By Request Program illustrates the calibre of our Touring Team, with participants and clients rating their satisfaction at 98% good to excellent.

CASE STUDY: PUBLIC PROGRAMS AT REDLAND ART GALLERY

In 2019, Flying Arts worked with Redland Art Gallery to provide facilitators for several of their public programs including Family Sundays and School holiday workshops. Family workshops included clay pinch pots and artist books with Nancy Brown; children's workshops included printmaking with Kay Watanabe and drawing with Megan Grinstead.

These programs provided children with an adventure away from screen time and an opportunity to learn traditional skills. Often, it was the participants' first experience with these art forms and they were able to experiment with unfamiliar media to express their ideas in new ways. Participants of these workshops gained new connections with their community, and the Gallery, and discovered a newfound confidence in art making. We look forward to continuing this important partnership into 2020.

CASE STUDY: GRANT WRITING IN CENTRAL QUEENSLAND

Ashleigh Wheeler travelled to the Gladstone Region to deliver 3 one-day grant writing workshops for community members across 3 locations. The workshops focused on how to write Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) grants and introduced participants to the rollout of RADF funding in the local area. It also included time for individuals to develop their own project ideas.

As the participants were geographically diverse and hadn't met prior, many took the opportunity open dialogues among their peers and form working groups. Participants left the workshops with newly formed support networks

CASE STUDY: PLASTER BANDAGE CASTING AT FERNY GROVE HIGH SCHOOL

Simone Eisler often uses plaster casting and molding in her own practice. Senior students at Ferny Grove High School received great benefit from her hands-on instruction in a variety of plaster bandage techniques.

Simone began the workshop with a presentation featuring her own artwork to show how plaster bandages could be used in practice. Following a demonstration of various techniques, the group applied plaster bandages to found objects such as shells, horns and bowls. Molding natural objects in plaster bandage casts allowed the students to explore and achieve form in a quick, fun, and sometimes unexpected way. Ferny Grove State High School teachers also had the opportunity for professional development by learning new skills and techniques alongside their student cohort.

Our students really came away from the workshop inspired and geared up to continue exploring and developing their creations, which we will continue to work on next term.

In 2019 Flying Arts dedicated over \$40,000 to cross curriculum arts incursions in remote and regional Queensland thanks to generous support from Gandel Philanthropy and the 'Make Art Big in Small Schools' fundraising campaign in conjunction with matched funding provided by Plus 1 through Creative Partnerships Australia. This is the largest program Flying Arts has run to date.

The Small Schools Fund allowed schools to work collaboratively with an experienced artist to plan and deliver a visual arts incursion of their choice (up to the value of \$5,000). Each project combined multiple elements of the Australian School Curriculum to create arts rich experiences to benefit their students and the wider school community.

After reviewing 24 applications, the following projects were granted project support:

It is rare that in-office Flying Arts staff can travel to the regions to enrich relationships, take quality documentation and personally support delivered programs. Due to funding support from Gandel Philanthropy, the organisation was able to visit some of the participating schools. As a result, richer supporting material could be collected and subsequently developed into online resources to assist other educators wanting to deliver crosscurriculum content to their students. Several of the funded projects also received media attention.

Three of the supported projects were also selected for inclusion in a research project conducted by the University of Southern Queensland's Associate Professor Margaret Baguley and Flying Arts Chair, Professor John O'Toole. This research builds on the initial Connecting Arts with School Curriculum (CASC) project conducted in 2014. This continuing research aims to explore the process and outcomes of integrating visual arts in the classroom as a cross-curriculum teaching method. Findings are expected to be published in 2020.







CASE STUDY: MUTTABURRA STATE SCHOOL

Year level: Prep - Year 6 **Number of students:** 10

Cross curriculum links: Visual Art/Science/Humanities and Social

Sciences (HASS)

Muttaburra State School students participated in a 3-day workshop with Flying Arts facilitator Paul Stumkat to craft seat-tops for the Centre of Queensland Monument. This monument celebrates Muttaburra as the geographic centre of Queensland. The design incorporates Indigenous symbols around a central steel structure in the shape of Queensland.

Mr Turner, the Chaplain of Muttaburra State School was instrumental in working with the school's P&C committee to apply for the Small Schools Fund and with the Muttaburra community to bring the vision to life.

Local natural history artist Paul Stumkat led the students in a discussion of local cultural influences and symbolism, including Indigenous histories and the icon of the Muttaburrasaurus. Paul workshopped ideas with the students to develop coherent designs for the 20 cement seat-tops.

Students then created their own artworks which alternated between 'fossils' with pressed materials (shells, coloured gravel, marbles, stones and other found objects) and positive and negative handprints. Paul then guided the students through a session on colouring the discs with pigments.

Through this process, students were able to make an indelible mark on a significant local landmark within their community.

The students wholeheartedly engaged in a journey of discovery and creativity.

CASE STUDY: KULPI STATE SCHOOL

Year level: Prep - Year 6 **Number of students:** 27

Cross curriculum links: Visual Art/Science/Design and Technology

Kulpi State School welcomed ceramic artist Dianne Peach to facilitate a 5-day cross-curriculum art, science and design workshop for students and their families to create their own unique ceramic artworks. These artworks were afterwards displayed in an exhibition at their local Rosalie Gallery in Goombungee on the Darling Downs.

The workshop sessions were designed to teach the professional practice of ceramics. Participants assisted Dianne to build the kilns on school grounds, as well as crafting their own pieces.

Student and family member pairs were shown 3 basic methods of hand-building ceramics: pinch, coil, and slab. They then used these techniques to produce five pieces each, which were fired in the three newly-constructed kilns: sawdust, wood, and gas. The project incorporated science concepts and design and technology units while meeting student curriculum requirements for the visual arts unit 'Patterns in the Playground.'

This project has provided a rare opportunity for students and their parents or family members to experience an activity which is not otherwise available locally... It will become a lifetime memory!

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT WEBINARS

The 2019 webinar program offered a robust range of topics by presenters in academia, schools and industry. Attendance grew by approximately 30% over 2018, with 303 viewers tuning in across Queensland, Australia and overseas.

Webinars were provided that addressed the arts curriculum in primary and high school contexts, with a second stream addressing the delivery of visual arts teaching in conjunction with other curriculum areas. The webinars addressing Indigenous art and protocols and Visual Thinking Strategies were particularly well attended.



ARTIZ FOR EDUCATORS

In 2019, Flying Arts offered two 3-day intensives for educators, building on the success and continued interest in the program from 2018. 16 participants attended across both events to network with their peers and engage in hands-on skills development.

It was the second year for Artiz Innovation at the Edge. Teachers and educators came together at the State Library of Queensland to experiment and engage with the wide range of technologies and equipment available on-site, and create collaborative artworks that drew upon the library's collection.

In 2019 we offered Artiz Street Art for Educators for the first time, building upon our popular Artiz Street Art program for young artists. Educators worked alongside the student cohort to create an extraordinary mural on a 30 metre wall at the University of Southern Queensland under the guidance of artists Simon Degroot and Katie Whyte.

Held at State Library of Queensland, 9 students came together to create collaborative artworks using cutting-edge technologies. Augmented reality, laser cutting and 3D printing were just a few of the innovative mediums available for participants to explore.

Students explored the theme of 'keys and doors' to create small laser-cut installations across the venue that the public could engage with using augmented reality app, Artivive.

A highlight was a private session in the White Gloves Room of the library, where participants were given access to extraordinary materials and artefacts on the Old Windmill, the heritage-listed tower mill in Spring Hill. This provided a strong content and focus for creative exploration, enabling dynamic intersections between history, art and technology.

ART ENQUIRER

ART ENQUIRER 3 - 5 July

2019 saw Flying Arts and the Institute of Modern Art (IMA) co-produce Art Enquirer for the third year running. The program offered a rare insight into the inner workings of the visual arts industry, with 9 students touring galleries and artist studios across Brisbane, and engaging with industry mentors to sharpen their critical arts writing skills.

Students participated in an ongoing editorial process following the program, which resulted in their essays being published in the third annual Art Enquirer publication. The print publication was officially launched at the end of the year with a celebratory gathering at the IMA. Copies were distributed to every high-school in Queensland and key organisations across the state, and a digital copy was also made available online.

We continue to be delighted and amazed at the quality of writing produced by the students who attend this program.

In high school, the art world can be portrayed as mysterious and a bit intimidating so having this rare opportunity to be immersed in this industry is infinitely valuable to us at this stage of our lives.

Queensland is a state full of diverse ecosystems, wildlife, places, people and personalities. In 2019, artists were encouraged to explore the diverse elements and qualities that make up their own communities and locations within Queensland with the theme 'State of Diversity'.

This year, 174 artworks were submitted to the awards from across Queensland. The awards attracted over 2000 votes for People's Choice through an online gallery which displayed all submitted artworks.

9 regional Queensland artists shared in a \$25,000 prize pool, and 37 artworks were selected to tour in the *State of Diversity* exhibition, curated by Jonathan McBurnie. The exhibition, supported by Holding Redlich, will tour to Brisbane and regional centres in 2020 to 2021, including Lockyer Valley, Charleville, Roma, Charters Towers, Hervey Bay and Moranbah.







'Jabu Birriny', meaning 'land' and 'sea', celebrates the unique environment of Yarrabah and its ongoing importance to culture and people.

Originally developed by the State Library of Queensland in partnership with Yarrabah Arts and Cultural Precinct, Flying Arts is touring the exhibition 2019 – 2021 alongside a dynamic suite of public programs funded by Arts Queensland through the Playing Queensland Fund.

This additional support enabled Flying Arts to facilitate Yarrabah artists to tour with their exhibition to regional centres, to meet the local First Nations Elders and Community, and to participate in public programs. 8,655 visitors visited the *Jabu Birriny* exhibition in 2019.

COLOUR AND RESPONSE PROJECT

The Colour and Response Curatorial Mentorship Project was developed following the success of Moriarty's exhibition, Colour: Mervyn Moriarty, A Retrospective Exhibition which was held in Brisbane in 2016 to commemorate the 45th anniversary of Flying Arts.

Colour and Response allowed Flying Arts to put the spotlight on the regions to unearth the stories and artists constituting Merv Moriarty's legacy at the helm of the Flying Arts school.

Venues that participated in the project acted as historical 'art detectives,' searching through their local community for artists and artworks that were touched by Merv's influence in their region.

Flying Arts was successful in receiving Queensland Government funding to support this project through the Playing Queensland Fund. This allowed Lisa Beilby to travel to the regions to deliver curatorial mentorships. The funding also allowed Merv Moriarty to travel to each exhibition location to conduct his colour masterclasses with local artists.


65 artists, artsworkers and gallery volunteers participated in curatorial mentorships across 4 regional venues in total, 18 in 2019: Texas, Dalby, Roma and Bundaberg. These venues, plus Gladstone, developed 'response' exhibitions to accompany the exhibition, *Colour II*.

Following the mentorship workshops, each gallery produced a locally curated exhibition showcasing works from artists in their community, and presented them alongside pieces from local private and public collections, in response to Moriarty's works.

WANDERLUST

Wanderlust, an outcome of the 2018 Queensland Regional Art Awards (QRAA), began its tour in 2019. When submitting their artworks for inclusion, artists were asked to embrace a spirit of adventure to discover something unique about their own community or one that they visited within the state.

A total of 26 diverse artworks were selected to tour. Major Prize and Touring Exhibition partner, Holding Redlich, provided valuable support, which allowed a professional installer to attend each venue and assist with the installation process.

Flying Arts developed a dedicated Public Programs Menu, a valuable resource linking exhibiting artists with tour venues, through the Flying Arts By Request Program. Public Programs were diverse and colourful, from single artist visits in Winton to an arts festival opening at The Condensary, in Somerset.

The major achievement of the tour in 2019, for both Flying Arts' exhibition capacity and across the organisation, was the official launch of *Wanderlust* at Waltzing Matilda Centre in Winton. Over 50 artists, staff, board members and major sponsors travelled to Winton, contributing to the approximately 150 people who attended that event.

SEASONAL SITTINGS OF TINY ART

In 2019, Seasonal Sitting of Tiny Art continued to activate the public foyer spaces of Level 2 and 3 of the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts in Brisbane. ICONIC QUEENSLAND

Iconic Queensland was an outcome of the 2017 Queensland Regional Art Awards. The theme 'iconic Queensland' asked artists to explore the iconic structures, people, locations, events and lifestyles that shape the state's identity. The exhibition commenced its tour in 2018, and due to its popularity, will continue into early 2020.

In 2019, 2237 people attended the exhibition. During the overall tour, 6,493 audience members viewed the exhibition and 210 community members participated in associated public programs.

2019 marked the second year of Flying Arts administering the Regional Arts Fund (RAF). 75 applications were funded through Flying Arts administration.

Provided through Regional Arts Australia (RAA), the Regional Arts Fund is an Australian Government program designed to benefit regional and remote arts practitioners, artsworkers, audiences and communities.

RAF supports and promotes participation in, and access to, Australia's arts and culture in regional and remote Australia by:

- Encouraging and supporting sustainable economic, social and cultural development in regional communities
- Developing partnerships and networks which leverage financial and/or in-kind support for specific projects and encourage ongoing collaboration
- Developing audiences and broadening community engagement
 with the auto
- Increasing employment and professional development opportunities for, and raising the profile of, regional and remote artists

In 2019, Flying Arts administered three streams of funding: Quick Response Grants (QRGs); Community Project Grants (CPGs); and a special round of funding to facilitate travel for regional artists and artsworkers to Arts Ablaze, a new state Regional Arts Conference in Kooralbyn, Queensland.

CEO Kerryanne Farrer, RAF Administrator Amy Cook, and other Flying Arts staff also attended Arts Ablaze on behalf of Flying Arts. The conference was the first time that the regional arts sector of Queensland had come together since 2013.





The Regional Arts Fund (RAF) is an Australian Government program designed to benefit regional and remote arts practitioners, arts workers, audiences and communities. The fund is provided through Regional Arts Australia and is administered in Queensland by Flying Arts Alliance.

ARTS ABLAZE TRAVEL SUBSIDIES

A special funding round was provided to subsidise travel for artists and artsworkers in regional and remote Queensland to attend Arts Ablaze, Queensland's premier regional arts conference held in Kooralbyn, Queensland in 2019. The travel subsidies were available in two streams: participants and presenters. 39 applications were received, and 26 were approved.

QUICK RESPONSE GRANTS

Quick Response Grants offered up to \$3,000 per application for regional and remote artists and arts workers to undertake professional development opportunities or fund smaller projects. In 2019, 70 Quick Response Grant applications were received, and 37 were approved for funding.

These ranged from \$737 to the maximum amount of \$3,000, and spanned disciplines from circus and puppetry to cultural retention projects and professional development opportunities.

28 projects took place in Queensland, with a further 8 interstate and 1 overseas.

Community Project Grant Case Study: Arts Ablaze Queensland 2019 Regional Art Conference and Celebration

Scenic Rim Regional Council applied for RAF funding in 2019 to support elements of the Arts Ablaze Queensland 2019 Regional Art Conference and Celebration. The conference was a major initiative to support and develop a sustainable Regional Art Sector.

The successful funding contributed to a number of initiatives including: the transformation of Ramada Resort, the site of the event, through artist site activations; the employment of a program coordinator; and resources such as staging and marquees.

RAF funding bolstered Arts Ablaze's existing platform as a showcase for diverse and high-quality works coming out of regional Queensland including visual art, fashion, craft and design, theatre, music, digital arts and film.

Quick Response Grant Case Study: Participation in PAAXII International Symposium, Brisbane and Port Vila

In 2019, Mirndiyan Gununa Aboriginal Corporation received RAF funding to allow their Manager, John Armstrong, to attend the PAAXII International Symposium in Brisbane, and Port Vila, Vanuatu. The aim of John's involvement was to strengthen opportunities and connections that can be shared among remote island artists and craftspeople.

John's attendance at the symposiums allowed Mirndiyan Gununa Aboriginal Corporation to establish an artist exchange program between Vanuatu painters and weavers and artists from Far North Queensland. Issues of post-colonial development are common to both artist groups, and the program aims to foster ongoing networks of support, collaboration and cultural resilience.
