




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BOARD From the Chair

This year tested and challenged the Queensland Arts Sector in ways never experienced before. It also highlighted great resilience, collaboration and innovation in the arts' response to the Coronavirus Pandemic (COVID-19) as well as significant environmental, economic and social issues.

For Flying Arts Alliance this has meant a year of change and reshaping across our program, staff and Board to best support Queensland artists, educators, and creative communities, especially those in regional, rural and remote areas. Flying Arts has re-emerged with a strong foundation, the skills to adapt to changing conditions and a renewed sense of purpose. Our role in supporting the arts and its role in transforming and sustaining lives and livelihoods has been fortified through the events of 2020.

In March, Flying Arts launched its crisis management process in response to COVID-19. Under the leadership and guidance of the Staffing Committee, Executive Officer (EO) and Operations Lead, the organisation safely transitioned all Flying Arts staff to remote work spaces. Flying Arts EO, Kerryanne Farrer, supported staff virtually to adapt our programs to online delivery with great results.

During this crisis, Flying Arts staff completed the Salesforce Customer Relationship Management (CRM) project, which went live in April. We are incredibly grateful to our philanthropic sponsors and donors for their support, and our hardworking staff for achieving this during a time of crisis. Salesforce CRM was operating throughout the COVID-19 lockdown, greatly assisting with business continuity and the ability to work remotely. The Salesforce CRM software alongside Office 365 allowed Flying Arts staff to quickly revise scheduling, including a longterm restructure of programs and future plans. While unable to offer many of our programs as usual, we saw a high level of engagement and demand from the arts community who submitted an extensive range of high quality entries to the 2020 Queensland Regional Art Awards, and participated in our online artist and educators webinars program.

Some of our key events, including the Charleville Launch of the Queensland Regional Art Awards exhibition and 500 Club events, were postponed during 2020; however, these events have been scheduled for 2021 delivery.

Due to the challenges of COVID-19, our events and attendance rates halved; however, considering the impact COVID-19 had on the wider community, both in the Arts and beyond, we feel this was a great achievement. A stand out program for 2020 was Art Enquirer, delivered in partnership with the Institute of Modern Art (IMA) and online for the first time, which attracted the largest attendance rate to date of senior school students participating in a program of critical art writing.

In 2018, the Australian Government announced Flying Arts as the Queensland Administrators of the Regional Arts Fund (RAF). Flying Arts from July 2020 delivered Queensland's share of the Federal Government's Regional Arts Boost, a timely and a welcomed support for regional communities. This opportunity allowed Flying Arts to create a new staff position, RAF Program Lead, who continues to guide us as we take a significant role in the national Arts industry recovery. The opportunities created through Regional Arts Boost have carried over to 2021, with the creation of a RAF First Nations Cultural Worker position on Flying Arts' staff.

Our Audit and Risk Committee, led by Convenor Kathy Schaefer, met frequently during the critical period of the first half of the year to discuss business continuity and contingency. The Committee, alongside the EO, effectively steered Flying Arts through the COVID-19 lockdown period, leading to the development and implementation of a COVID-19 Safe Plan.

We give special thanks to Kerryanne Farrer for her outstanding leadership during this challenging time. We also acknowledge the confident leadership and expertise of Kathy Schaefer in her Convenor role and the same to former Chair, Professor John O'Toole AM, who extended his time as Chair of Flying Arts board, seeing us through the start of our crisis management process and the postponement of our Annual General Meeting (AGM) until June.

The hard work of the EO, Finance Officer and former Treasurer, Andy Stephanos, and current Treasurer, Louise Guy, ensured Flying Arts received JobKeeper allowances and other Federal stimulus package benefits. These initiatives were critical in allowing Flying Arts to remain both entirely solvent and 100% staff functional. Flying Arts also received generous pro bono support from Flying Arts board member, Kasia Kondas, who led the Staffing Committee.

Business continuity was further supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland, who provided Arts organisations with complete rent relief for 2020 and funding for 2021 — extending the life of our 2017-2020 funding from four to five years. We are grateful for the ongoing support of the Queensland Government and Arts Queensland as our main funding partner. We also express our deep gratitude to our longstanding philanthropic partner Tim Fairfax Family Foundation, for their second round of three-year capacity funding, which concluded in September 2020.

At the AGM in June 2020, the Flying Arts' board underwent significant transitions. We farewelled the esteemed Chair of the board, Professor John O'Toole AM, Treasurer Andy Stephanos, Vice-Chair Susan Ostling and Margaret Baguley. Sarah Barron and Kasia Kondas were welcomed as new co-Chairs. Flying Arts greatly appreciate our outgoing, continuing and new board members' expertise and commitment to Flying Arts' community.

In September 2020 the new Flying Arts Board met to set our strategic business goals for 2021, plan our 50th Anniversary and consider organisational redesign options for a sustainable future. The loss of revenue over 2020 saw Flying Arts focus shift to core business operations, and the resulting restructure saw the loss of our Exhibitions and Development roles — a hard but necessary decision to "future-proof" the organisation. The Board guided the implementation of the restructure and new organisational design, with the staff transition process concluded by end of year. We are indebted to the invaluable pro bono assistance provided to us by McCullough Robertson Lawyers in the management of this process and the updating of our staff contracts. We are grateful to our Secretary Gabriella Ritchie for making this possible.

We would like to thank the Board, EO and staff for their extraordinary work in what has been an extraordinary year. We also acknowledge and thank the artists, arts workers and educators who facilitated or engaged in Flying Arts programs, as well as our generous partners and donors who supported Flying Arts during 2020. We finished the year with an invigorated vision, many new online programs and initiatives and a great team dedicated to taking Flying Arts forward.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER 2020 in Summary

This year saw great change within our organisation as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, with the disruption of our everyday business practices and programs leading to the innovation of new program formats in our attempt to adapt to what has been coined the "new normal". The arts sector was affected badly by the global pandemic, as venues closed and livelihoods paused or ceased. We at Flying Arts Alliance weathered this storm as best we could.

In March of 2020, the Flying Arts staff swiftly transitioned to an agile working arrangement with all staff working from home from 16 March 2020. This could not have been achieved without the efforts of Operations Lead Paul Thompson, and the support of the Audit Committee's crisis working party. The enormous efforts in 2019 to implement a business system upgrade to Salesforce CRM and Office 365 meant the structures and technology needed to work remotely were already in place. Our experience in promoting and conducting webinars over a decade meant similarly that our services were in a good position to transfer seamlessly to online delivery.

Through a staff-led change management process, we employed a methodology, named the 4Ds (Deliver, deliver Differently, Delay, Drop), to all our services and programs. Through this we achieved a continuation of over 50% of programming, with approximately 50% attendance and participation across the board compared to previous years. All changes were conveyed to our network by our Marketing and Communications Lead, Kat Johnston and her successor Odette Miller — who took on our Marketing and Communications role in July.

Despite the disturbance and restrictions of COVID-19, our 49 years of organisational resilience and adaptability, coupled with experience in delivering services to remote communities, prepared us for these organisational changes. Our results and achievements are outlined in the pages that follow, however I would like to highlight some key achievements:

- 118 activities were delivered to
- 5,201 participants and
- 14,259 exhibition attendees (including 9,000 online gallery attendees), across
- 32 unique regional locations.

Overall satisfaction with our services remains high, with 98% of our participants rating our activities and services as good to excellent. Our website continues as a high use resource with a total 127,947 page views – 41,907 (84%) first time viewers.

When restrictions eased, Flying Arts was one of the first to implement COVID-19 Safe plan for workshops and events. Using industry approved plans and guidelines, we ensured our team was confident in delivering COVID-19 safe activities on the ground. This process, led by our Scheduled Program Lead Chanel Lucas, successfully rolled out across our programs and services, and was shared and adopted by colleagues and partners within our network.

Like the metaphoric swan, the team here at Flying Arts put in an enormous amount of work and swift paddling to keep the business running and our services available for the artists, arts workers, educators and communities we serve. Staffing changed throughout 2020, with Marketing and Communications Lead Kat Johnston, Scheduled Program Lead Julie Robson and By Request Lead Tallara Gray resigning from their positions during lockdown. Flying Arts extends a warm thank you for their collective efforts and contributions to the organisation.

Late in 2020, Flying Arts was unable to secure sufficient funding for 2021 operations and programs. This resulted in the loss in personnel and expertise from our Exhibition Lead and Development Lead, ably held by Lisa Beilby and Karen Plitt respectively, and the sidestep of our Administration (RAF) Officer, Amy Cook, into a part-time RAF Engagement Officer role.

Despite these losses, the Flying Arts team quickly regrouped, with staff taking up new or expanded roles as detailed below:

Operations Lead, Paul Thompson; Program Team Lead, Chanel Lucas; By Request Program and Membership Lead, Madeline Brewer; Marketing and Communications Coordinator, Odette Miller; RAF Program Lead, Nigel Lavender; and Amy Cook as previously mentioned. Additional workload will be supported by project contractors, for instance Emma Gardner will continue to coordinate the funded 'Our Perfect New World' project. The management of exhibitions will be distributed across the team until end of 2021. The Development function will be undertaken by the EO.

The result of the above change and unanticipated test of endurance is more streamlined operations, with a hierarchical reporting system thanks to the implementation of team leads, creating a more sustainable business model.

The day-to-day financial functions have now fully transitioned from longterm staffer Andy Stephanos to Jacqui Lowrie as Finance Officer with Cara Hughes as a Financial Consultant, supported by Operations Lead, Paul Thompson, to maintain the operational aspects and the executive financial responsibilities of the EO and Treasurer Louise Guy.

The organisation is ever grateful for the funding support of the Queensland State Government. We thank the Queensland State Government for both extending our four-year core funding for an additional year into 2021 and waiving rent on our tenancy at the Judith Wright Centre from March – December 2020.

Flying Arts is proud to be the administrator of the Regional Arts Fund (RAF) on behalf of the Australian Government and in partnership with Regional Arts Australia (RAA). The first support packages in July 2020 promised \$10 million to impacted regional artists and communities. Our team quickly adapted in constant collegial communication with RAA to build and deliver the RAF Recovery Boost Fund.

The distribution of RAF Boost funds was a huge undertaking, and the Flying Arts team achieved outstanding results - in 6 months (1 July - 31 Dec



2020) distributing \$575,309 to 76 grant recipients (equivalent to the same volume over a 12-month period in 2019). A total grant amount of \$788,930 was distributed to regional artists and communities in 2020.

Monitoring and effectively reporting on the impact of Flying Arts' programs is incredibly important. In 2019 Flying Arts received a Queensland Community Foundation grant to engage consultant Bridget Jones from Wavelength to establish an evaluation framework in line with our strategic goals. This project was unfortunately delayed due to Flying Arts' inability to implement new evaluation frameworks during the Salesforce CRM system upgrade and change management during the COVID-19 crisis. Flying Arts intend to finish the project in early 2021.

We have been buoyed during this extra-ordinary year by the incredible support of our Board, patrons, partners, donors and arts community, who continued to generously give and connect where they could. Thanks to this ongoing backing, we were able to offer 12 bursary places to artists in our programs; our 500 club donors continued to contribute to our programs; our Queensland Regional Art Awards (QRAA) partners enabled us to deliver a full awards program, and our travel, logistics and venue partners enabled us to present exhibitions around the state and workshops and intensives when we could.

I commend the Board on the strategic and pragmatic assistance through the crisis, and the necessary and difficult decision for the future of the organisation, which they communicated with myself and the Flying Arts team in a clear and timely manner. Given this environment, their foresight in investing in the 50th Anniversary project (Oct 2021-Oct 2022) ensured this significant and important milestone for the organisation will be rightly acknowledged.

Our artists, arts workers, educators and supporters stayed connected through our programs and digital platforms, including our new Facebook "Flying Arts Community" Group which is continuing to grow in follower numbers and engagement. The support of the Arts Community helps us work towards our vision of "Art for Life", even through a global pandemic.

In 2021, we will focus on celebrating 50 years of supporting our community of talented creatives and educators. I look forward to celebrating with you all. Let's "Paint the Town"!

WORKSHOPS AND PROJECTS

The Flying Arts By Request Program offers workshops and programs on demand. In 2020, workshops and programs were delivered both in-person and online for schools and creative communities. These workshops were delivered across Queensland and covered topics of visual arts, and arts business and management.

In 2020, The Flying Arts By Request Program achieved great results despite the impacts of COVID-19 and the resulting economic fallout. Flying Arts' network of artist and arts worker facilitators grew to include 63 people, with a variety of specialties and workshop strengths. Several programs moved online with facilitators embracing alternative modes of delivery due to restrictions placed upon travel and in-person events. Arts business and management workshops focusing on grant writing, digital adaptation and marketing, were popular throughout the year — with many communities seeking professional development.

Schools are central to By Request — making up of 44% of clients and confirmed bookings. In-person delivery was limited throughout the year, however projects delivered in-person at schools in Terms One and Four included a range of engaging and colourful curriculum-based classroom workshops and projects.

Flying Arts received significant positive feedback on its By Request Program illustrating the calibre of our Touring Team. Participants and clients in 2020 programs rated their satisfaction at 98% – good to excellent.

CASE STUDY: GRANT WRITING, SONIA COZENS

Participants: 15


Workshop area: Community engagement

Facilitator, Sonia Cozens, presented a full-day workshop as part of Moreton Bay Regional Council's Cultivate the Arts program in November 2020. The workshop aimed to assist community members in applying for the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) grants.

The workshop was successful on exploring topics relating to:

- The funding landscape
- Tips for applying for funding
- Information about RADF guidelines
- How to do an elevator pitch
- Navigating the Expressions of Interest (EOI) process
- How to write a project description, application, and budget, and
- What to include in support materials.

In a year of perpetual change and new funding opportunities, this workshop built confidence and the grant writing capacity of Moreton Bay Regional Council community members.







CASE STUDY: JOHN VILLIERS PRIZE, KATIE WHYTE

Age group: 12 - 26 years old

Workshop area: Youth Exhibition Development

Facilitator, Katie Whyte, ran a two-day workshop for the Waltzing Matilda Centre and The John Villier's Trust in Winton, QLD to assist young artists to enter art prizes.

The workshop was held in September over the weekend the Winton Opal Festival and the closing weekend of the Vision Splendour Outback Film Festival. This was a great experience for Katie, as she got to experience a vibrant and active outback Queensland town, while working with young local artists.

Through this workshop, participants learnt the intricacies of applying to art prizes and how to develop concepts for artworks around a theme. The practical art components of the workshop included:

- Creating colour palettes
- Exploration of mixing colours outside of the traditional colour wheel
- Drawing exercises, such as blind drawing, continual line drawing and upside-down drawing.

CASE STUDY: ST HILDA'S SCHOOL, SUE LOVEDAY

Age group: 6 - 12 years old Participants: 20

Workshop area: Sculpture and Installation

St Hilda's School students participated in a one-day stop motion animation workshop early in 2020. The children crafted their own stories, characters, and scenes out of mixed media and created an animation to present to their class. Facilitator, Sue Loveday, planned a workshop with engaging craft projects of high interest for 6 - 12-year-olds. The day provided students with an opportunity to learn new media and art skills in a fun, social environment.

CQ SHOPFRONT

Flying Arts and Idea's Distillery partnered to provide business skill development workshops for the 2020 CQ Shopfront Project in Bundaberg, Rockhampton and Mackay. This project engages local artists to develop a range of handmade products that are unique to the Central Queensland region. The outcome of the project is to mentor local artists to develop a product range that can be sold in retail outlets, and be available at regional and public galleries and tourist information centres.

This program was originally planned as face-to-face workshops, but transitioned to online workshops during COVID-19 lockdowns.

EDUCATORS Scheduled Program

8 EDUCATOR PROGRAMS

338 PARTICIPANTS

The impact of COVID-19 returned interesting results for our in-person Educator workshops and webinar programs. Educators were particularly interested in accessing professional development opportunities without having to travel to a major centre.

With restrictions limiting face-to-face participation for in-person workshops, we saw a rise of interest in our online webinars. During 2020, the webinar program for Educators showed good engagement as participants joined from their homes, studios, and verandahs. The in-person workshop program for educators was impacted by COVID-19 restrictions, and low engagement as face-to-face program returned, but overall, there was a greater engagement due to the webinar program.

In 2021, we hope to build on the increasing interest in webinars and provide more high-quality online professional development for Educators through our programs.

EDUCATOR WORKSHOPS

Two in-person workshops were delivered for Educators at TAFE Queensland South Bank. These workshops focused on visual art skills that connect with the Queensland Visual Art Syllabus. Educators explored new art techniques, practiced processes, and created artworks to take back to their classrooms.

Flying Arts hoped to deliver two Young Artist programs in 2020, however experienced challenges due to COVID-19. Flying Arts and the Institute of Modern Art (IMA) successfully collaborated to present the fourth edition of Art Enquirer in 2020, however the program was delivered to participating senior school students through online delivery. This program engaged 14 senior school students from July to August 2020.

Due to the impact of COVID-19, Art Innovation was unfortunately postponed to 2021.



The 2020 Queensland Regional Art Awards saw artists from regional Queensland explore the complex notion of decadence within their own communities and households across the state – both in times of shortage and in times of plenty.

Decadence invited notions of luxury and self-indulgence. It evoked ideas of wanton excess and wastefulness, perhaps with a casual or deliberate disregard of consequence. Dependent on circumstance, the exhibiting artists' personal definitions of decadence shifted quite suddenly.

Last year, 153 artworks were submitted to the awards from across the state. The awards attracted over 2,000 votes for People's Choice through an online gallery which displayed all submitted artworks.

Eight regional Queensland artists shared in a \$25,000 prize pool, and 37 artworks were selected to tour in the Decadence exhibition, curated by Dr Campbell Gray. The exhibition, supported by Holding Redlich, began touring to Brisbane and regional centres in November 2020. This will continue until December 2021, with participating regional venues including Ipswich, Charleville, Texas, Charters Towers, and Tambo.

The eight winning artworks of the 2020 QRAA were the focus of the Ekphrasis Challenge, a new partnership with Queensland Poetry Festival. Poets from around Australia were challenged to respond to one of the award-winning artworks with a 12-line poem. Of these entries, eight finalists were selected to accompany the artworks in the Decadence touring exhibition.





'Jabu Birriny', meaning 'land' and 'sea', celebrates the unique environment of Yarrabah and its ongoing importance to culture and people.

Originally developed by the State Library of Queensland in partnership with Yarrabah Arts and Cultural Precinct, Flying Arts is touring the exhibition 2019 – 2021 alongside a dynamic suite of public programs funded by Arts Queensland through the Playing Queensland Fund. This additional support enabled Flying Arts to facilitate a tour for Yarrabah artists and *Jabu Birriny* to regional centres, meeting the local First Nations Elders and Community, and to participate in public programs.

8,655 visitors visited the Jabu Birriny exhibition in 2020.

COLOUR AND RESPONSE

The Colour and Response project comprised of Colour II: Merv Moriarty, in the Field, a touring exhibition featuring recent works by artist, art educator and founder of Flying Arts Alliance, Mervyn Moriarty, and a 'response' exhibition curated by a local gallery. The final exhibition was held in 2020 at Gladstone Regional Art Gallery and Museum.

2,832 attendees visited the exhibition and a total 22 people participated in two public programs.

Colour II: Merv Moriarty in the Field allowed Flying Arts to put the spotlight on regional Queensland to unearth stories and artists that represent Merv Moriarty and the Flying Arts School's legacy. Venues that participated in the project acted as historical 'art detectives,' searching through their local community for artists and artworks that were touched by Merv's influence in their region.

Flying Arts was successful in receiving Queensland Government funding to support this project through the Playing Queensland Fund.

ITERATE | ELABORATE

Iterate | *Elaborate* is an exhibition of work by artist Leigh Schoenheimer that began it's tour of regional Queensland in November 2020 at Lapunyah Art Gallery. 401 attendees visited this exhibition in 2020.

The exhibition is an optical exploration of the logic of modernism and abstraction, as told through the genre of still life painting. Schoenheimer's whimsical use of found objects and pieces of brightly coloured timber toys, spark feelings of familiarity and joy while seductive colour schemes tie her complex works together and are fundamental to both a delightful viewing experience and the creation of meaning.

This tour includes a significant visual arts education focus with learning resources, linking artworks to education curriculum.

STATE OF DIVERSTY

State of Diversity is the exhibition outcome of the 2019 Queensland Regional Art Awards (QRAA). The exhibition, supported by Holding Redlich, began its tour in 2020 and visited both metro and regional galleries including Brisbane, Lockyer Valley, Roma, Charters Towers and Moranbah.

Artists were encouraged to explore the idea of a "State of Diversity". A total of 174 artworks were submitted to the award and a short list of 37 artworks were selected to tour the state.

A total 1,665 people attended the exhibition and 195 participated in associated public programs.

OUR PERFECT NEW WORLD

Our Perfect New World Project (OPNWP) is a new Flying Arts project running from 2020 to 2021. OPNWP is designed to support and encourage young people to engage in the visual arts in regional Queensland cultural centres. This program and associated workshops are run alongside the touring exhibitions of the 2019 and 2020 QRAA, State of Diversity and Decadence.

This program offers young artists with the exciting opportunity to develop new skills, techniques, ways of thinking and writing about art. In community and schools, young artists create artworks responding to the theme 'our perfect new world' under the guidance of accomplished arts practitioners. These workshops culminate in a young persons' exhibition at their local gallery displayed alongside the QRAA exhibition.

OPNWP engages schools with an education kit addressing Queensland Visual Arts Curriculum and a children's activity centre run at participating galleries.

OPNWP was first implemented in 2020 in Moranbah with 100 people participating in our programs — including seven workshops for children, and one professional development workshop in art handling for the staff at Coalface Art Gallery.

The Regional Arts Fund is an Australian Government program provided through Regional Arts Australia (RAA) designed to benefit regional and remote arts practitioners, arts workers, audiences and communities.

This year marked the third year of Flying Arts' administering the Regional Arts Fund (RAF), and was the largest financial contribution to regional Queensland arts made during Flying Arts' tenure as the RAF administrator.

A total of 179 eligible applications were submitted and 88 applications were funded through Flying Arts' administration in 2020.

RAF supports and promotes participation in, and access to, Australia's arts and culture in regional and remote Australia by:

- Encouraging and supporting sustainable economic, social and cultural development in regional communities
- Developing partnerships and networks which leverage financial and/or in-kind support for specific projects and encourage ongoing collaboration
- Developing audiences and broadening community engagement with the arts
- Increasing employment and professional development opportunities for, and raising the profile of, regional and remote artists

In 2020, Flying Arts administered five streams of funding: Quick Response Grants; Community Project Grants and three streams under the Recovery Boost; Relief, Recovery and Renewal.



The Regional Arts Fund (RAF) is an Australian Government program designed to benefit regional and remote arts practitioners, arts workers, audiences and communities. The fund is provided through Regional Arts Australia and is administered in Queensland by Flying Arts Alliance.

QUICK RESPONSE GRANTS

Quick Response Grants (QRGs) aim to support small arts or cultural projects that cannot be funded by other means because of their nature or timing. QRGs offered up to \$3,000 per application for regional and remote artists and arts workers to undertake professional development opportunities or fund small projects.

In 2020, 20 QRG applications were received, and 17 were approved for funding ranging in size from \$939 to the maximum amount of \$3,000. Requests spanned disciplines from music and theatre, to cultural retention projects and professional development opportunities.

Throughout the year, 14 projects took place in Queensland, with one going ahead in Sydney, one in Adelaide, and another overseas.

COMMUNITY PROJECT GRANTS

Community Project Grants offer up to \$30,000 for applications which benefit the community, increase access and participation in the arts, and/or provide direct benefits to artists and arts workers. There was only one round of Community Project Grants in 2020 due to the introduction of the RAF Recovery Boost Fund crisis relief funding.

This year, 39 Community Project Grant applications were submitted in this round. Of these, 30 eligible applications were assessed by a peer assessment panel and 7 were approved for funding.

Approved projects ranged from the Quandamooka Festival Fibre Arts Project, to Heart of Gold International Short Film Festival's 'The Prospect', a four-day offering of workshops, roundtables, films, podcasts, immersive and interactive experiences.

The RAF Recovery Boost Fund was a \$10 million targeted measure announced by the Australian Government in 2020 as part of the Relief and Recovery Fund. Responding to the difficulties experienced by regional artists, arts organisations and communities due to COVID-19, the Recovery Boost was one-off funding delivered through the Regional Arts Fund and sought to offer short (Relief), medium (Recovery) and long-term (Renewal) support.

RAF RECOVERY BOOST - RELIEF

Relief grants were designed to assist regional artists, and arts organisations and communities to meet their immediate needs. This could include asset replacement or purchase, support for arts practice (including self-directed residency/research and development), small projects and professional development opportunities.

RAF RECOVERY BOOST - RECOVERY

Recovery grants were designed to meet the medium-term recovery needs of regional artists, organisations and communities. Projects in this programs focused on activities that assisted in recovery from the impacts of COVID-19.

Project activities include creative recovery projects, training programs, operational recovery plans, asset purchase or replacement (up to \$5000) and the development of risk plans and emergency operating procedures and responses.

RAF RECOVERY BOOST - RENEWAL

Renewal grants will provide up to three-years of funding to support projects that have strong partnerships and demonstrated long term outcomes, with sustainable future-positioning focus. Funding decisions to be announced in April 2021.

RAF Recovery Boost - Relief Case Study: Tropical Arts Annual Shakespeare Festival

October 2020 saw Tropical Arts' 12th annual Shakespeare at the Tanks performed in Cairns. The production of "Shakespeare's Sonnets & Verse" featured short pieces by a diverse group of 12 directors from Tropical Arts theatre-making community. Facing limited audience numbers due to COVID, Tropical Arts received RAF Relief funding to livestream the performance.

The livestream team included two technicians to set up and liaise with production tech operators and production manager; two camera operators; and one livestream director who operated the vision switch backstage. 125 devices watched the livestream over the course of the almost two hour performance. The finished recording was posted on the Tropical Arts YouTube channel, and has been viewed 756 times. The performance was also professionally photographed, and the resultant images will be used to build social media engagement into the future.



Quick Response Grant Case Study: Cairns Historical Society Reef Productions Assessment

Over the course of three months in 2020, Cairns artist and Elder Nerelle Nicol developed her social history curatorial skills, completing a Significance Assessment for a collection of original 'souvenir' artworks and designs from Indigenous and non-Indigenous FNQ artists. Narelle worked with the Queensland Museum's Museum Development Officer Dr Joanna Wills to develop a report on the future of the collection, and an exhibition plan for the Cairns Museum.

Importantly, Narelle was paid for her time, allowing her to take up this valuable professional development opportunity without sacrificing her own financial stability. The mentoring component of the project has helped to build both skills and confidence in the recipient, as well as foster a continuing interest and intention to pursue aspects of this research topic further. The opportunity to work in this way identified potential opportunities for future work and collaboration around this rich research topic.
