BY REQUEST: SILVERSMITHING IN MT ISA

Flying Arts Artist, Clare Poppi, travelled to Mt Isa for the forth year running to deliver a 2 day 'Introduction to Silversmithing' workshop.

FROM THE FACILITATOR

It's really about overcoming the tyranny of distance and allowing people in regional and remote areas to have access to some of the arts and creative endeavours that people in the city take for granted... In the city there's lots of places that you could go and learn to do some silversmithing or learn to do some painting, but out here it's a little bit more difficult.

FROM THE ORGANISER

We've had past students actually go on to work with a jeweller here in town and you just know you're giving the student an interest that they may not be exposed to in other areas, and that can lead to their passion and purpose in life.

FROM THE STUDENT PARTICIPANTS

This week's course has been really interesting because this is the first time I've done silversmithing and jewellery making and to be able to create your own jewellery and like, be able to wear it, I think that's pretty cool.

Doing things like this could open up things that you've never thought about and who knows - you could actually be really good at it.



BY REQUEST: DRAWING WITH **DETERMINATION IN CHARTERS TOWERS**

Flying Arts Artist, Scott Maxwell, spent seven days straight in Charters Towers battling 38 degree heat to teach drawing to a fluctuating group of participants of all skill levels, aged from 10 months to 83 years old.

FROM THE FACILITATOR

This was the longest and most rewarding workshop I have delivered for Flying Arts, at such a wonderful location with genuine, down-to-earth people.

Just like to say, that through Flying Arts, I have meet some truly wonderful people, seen many crazy communities and have travelled through some of the most dramatic landscapes on earth... and all this keeps me quite connected to my own arts practice.

FROM THE ORGANISER

Scott took great care to understand the different levels of skill and experience in the group, and then to deliver to suit all levels. He is genuinely interested in working with regional communities such as ours, which added good vibes and good humour to the workshop.

BOARD From the Chair

It is my pleasure to report on another successful, progressive year for Flying Arts. Though it was perhaps not quite as momentous as our 'colourful' 45th Anniversary, for both Board and organisation it was even more substantial.

Now is the time for many small-to-medium (S2M) not-for-profit arts organisations like us, founded in the easy-going days of 'community arts' in the 1960s and 1970s, to better formalise our governance. This has provided one major Board initiative this year: a 'Governance Review' proposed and funded by our major funding partner, Arts Queensland.

Why was this necessary? I joined the Board six years ago, on a casual invitation by the Executive Officer. I was supported by the Chair, though we had not met till I dropped by for my first Board meeting. I was elected to the board at my first Annual General Meeting, and quickly picked up enough about the organisation and the job of the Board to contribute a bit. Unexpectedly, the Chair at the time (who with the Executive Officer was still making nearly all organisational decisions) withdrew from the position to avoid a conflict of interest. No-one else felt any more ready or willing than I did to step forward... and I found myself Chair. Almost the first point of business was the imminent departure of our then Executive Officer.

It was, as they say, a steep learning curve for me and for the new Executive Officer. However, our predecessors left us strong foundations to build on: financial stability, an able, stable and committed staff, a good reputation, full order books for our services, and a unified Board. We had regained recurrent funding, and were already on the way to addressing the novel professional demands that new legislation, and our funders, were putting on us.

Both the organisation and the Board were changing. The new Executive Officer and the Treasurer restructured the staffing to be more equitable, efficient, transparent and self-sufficient - and the staff less overloaded. An informal structure of Board sub-committees had also emerged. New Board members were selected to sub-committees with a specific focus on requisite skills and based on their willingness to contribute. The Board had already collaboratively compiled a formal Risk Management strategy and a forward-looking Strategic Plan, been strongly involved in the recurrent funding push, and were working towards a coherent fund-raising strategy.

This was the promising situation at the beginning of 2017, buoyed by the great success of our 2016 Anniversary tribute to our founder Merv Moriarty.

This year the Board, with minimal change, has continued to make steps forward. They've also made one large leap of faith. At the Annual General Meeting we bade grateful farewells to long-serving Sue Sara and more recent Lorraine Nothling, and welcomed aboard senior public servant Kathy Schaefer. The nascent committee structure has been formalised into three hard-working sub-committees.

The Audit and Risk Committee has already laid down new governance procedures and overhauled the Risk Management Plan. The Development Committee has led us into our leap, commissioning a development and fund-raising consultancy, and started recruitments for a new Development Lead staff position - both funded by our reserves. The newly formed Staffing sub-committee found themselves with little on their plate, as the major staff restructure had already taken place. Thanks to the collaborative approach and skills of the Executive Officer and this committee, together with the goodwill shown by staff, those radical changes in staff structure have been smoothly and cooperatively implemented.

The Governance Review gave us a glowing report card, but there is still more to be done. The review helpfully pointed out key areas still in need of professionalisation. An annual Board retreat has been organised, to get on with these tidying-up tasks, and to create a clear vision for the future.

The Exhibitions program, now spearheaded by a designated Exhibitions Lead, kicked off with the launch of *Colours of Queensland*, the touring exhibition of the 2016 Queensland Regional Art Awards. This event was attended by our Cultural Patrons Tim and Gina Fairfax, as well as Assistant Minister of State Jennifer Howard, representing the Arts Minister. The exhibition was officially launched by Simon Wright, Assistant Director, Learning and Public Engagement, QAGOMA. *Colours of Queensland*, was one of three successful exhibitions that toured regional Queensland. Two other exhibition programs rounded out our Brisbane offerings.

Our professionalisation of development and fundraising is already paying off. The Flying Arts 500 *Club*, brainchild of Flying Arts Finance Officer, Andy Stephanos, hosted its first VIP event with fine wine and a moving speech by Queensland Regional Art Awards winner, Karen Stephens. The club now has a growing list of distinguished donors, including Karen herself. The names of the 500 *Club* members in 2017 can be found on the inner cover of this report.

We gratefully acknowledge the support of Arts Queensland, our major funding partner. We also extend particular thanks to our philanthropic partner, The Tim Fairfax Family Foundation, who have renewed their support of our organisation with a further three years of funding support.

Flying Arts could not function without the assistance of our like-minded sponsors, supporters, partners and donors. Toll (who provide the crucial exhibition transport), Travel Associates, the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts and RSM deserve special mention; all contributions are acknowledged throughout this report.

Our connection to the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) grows year by year. Partly in recognition of this, we intend to embark on new major regional and rural initiatives with the University of Southern Queensland, including research projects and a projected expansion of our webinar program. In the new year, *Iconic Queensland*, the touring exhibition of the Queensland Regional Art Awards, will launch on-campus at USQ Artsworx Gallery in Toowoomba, to emphasise our commitment to partnership. This is the first time the exhibition will be launched outside Brisbane.

However, Flying Arts is all about people. I will finish by thanking my hardworking Board colleagues, the dedicated (and still overloaded) staff, our squad of Flying Artists who invariably meet all the 'excellent' response indicators, and our small army of members and volunteers.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER 2017 in Summary

2017 was another steady altitude climb for our little light art-craft, Flying Arts Alliance. 2017 was the first year of the new State Government quadrennial funding for small to medium arts organisations. The year saw our new Strategic Plan 2016-2020 integrated and embedded across business, our delivered program, and internal staff performance programs. There was a consolidation of the new staffing structure set at the end of 2016, and a small staffing increase.

In 2017, FAA recorded a 98% satisfaction rating across its 230 programs and services, largely attributable to the organisation's prioritisation of community engagement and the collaborative approach undertaken throughout program planning and delivery.

To achieve our primary purpose of providing equitable and affordable access to high quality arts and cultural services throughout Queensland, especially for those with limited access, FAA aims to position itself as the:

- 'go to' organisation for an integrated range of products and services designed to support regional arts and cultural development;
- membership organisation of choice for regional artists and arts organisations seeking professional development initiatives; and
- facilitator of strategic partnerships and alliances with regional arts, education, development and local government sectors amongst others.

Generous capacity support from the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation has enabled me to work closely with the board to set this vision.

In the final year of this three-year philanthropic support we had large payoffs in terms of staff skill and confidence to take the lead on the portfolios. This has allowed us to work more on the strategic vision and relationships, and work "on" the business, as distinct to "in" the business.

We were thrilled to have secured a further three years' capacity funding from the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation at the end of 2017, to consolidate learning and structural reform and look towards 'securing our future' with a focus on fundraising. We also have renewed focus on strengthening our relationships with networks in the west and far north.

As part of our commitment to regional arts development in 2017, Flying Arts was a key member of the Regional Arts Working Group of the Queensland Chamber of Arts and Culture. This work has been pivotal in laying the groundwork for a new landscape of regional arts in Queensland, and is well recognised by our peers.

Over the years, Flying Arts has established and fostered genuine strategic partnerships and alliances with commercial and philanthropic partners, all of whom support the organisation due to our trusted reputation and continuing achievements.

We are also proactively seeking new partners, collaborators and supporters to increase our breadth and depth of reach throughout Queensland. Within the past year we have brokered 13 new projects or partnerships with organisations such as Brisbane Festival, QUT Art Museum, USQ Artsworx, Ironlak, Cairns Regional Gallery, Institute of Modern Art (IMA), The Johnson, Miro Apartments, Queensland Art Teachers Association (QATA), Queensland Poetry Festival, Access Arts, the National Association of Visual Arts (NAVA) and the Geoff Booth Foundation.

Our 2017 suite of programs and services have demonstrated our desire to reach out to all parts of the community. Our client mix continues to range from individual artists, young artists and educators, through to schools, local government, arts and non-arts community organisations. Over half of our clients have been in or providing services to regional Queensland.

As an organisation we have worked towards engaging more significantly with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. As a result, I was invited to attend the Indigenous Arts Centres Association (IACA) conference in Yarrabah in October to connect with art centre managers and artists. Two potential touring exhibitions with Indigenous Arts Centres are also in the planning phase for delivery in 2018/19.

We have presented the most extensive annual program to date, both in our demand-driven program, and across our planned program of workshops, webinars and consultations. The Artiz Young Artist Programs have been refined, with Artiz Public and Artiz Innovative returning this year. A new partnership with the Institute of Modern Art enabled the development of a third offering - a critical writing program resulting in Art *Enquirer*, a broadsheet publication written by student participants.

Our popular Exhibition Development Program (EDP) was delivered in a new weekend intensive format in 2017. For the first time, the program was delivered both regionally and within Brisbane, with great success. As a result of the program, participating artist Chrys Zantis was selected by the Queensland College of Art to exhibit in 2018. Brisbane participants formed their own collective following the intensive and started planning their own group exhibition. Flying Arts was delighted to extend them an opportunity to exhibit in the latter part of 2017.

2017 was not without its challenges. Our first foray into conference planning for the Queensland Art Teachers Association Conference was hampered by communication and logistical challenges. In spite of this, the conference ultimately received overwhelmingly positive feedback from delegates who attended. We were notified that renovations at the Judith Wright Centre would result in the loss of a gallery space. In response, we trialled a new exhibition format that successfully activated the foyer spaces in the Centre and provided opportunities for our members to showcase their art. Ever adaptable in situations that test our abilities, our skilled team flew through any turbulence that came our way.

Words are not enough to express my sincere gratitude and thanks to the board, staff, touring artists and facilitators, members, volunteers and supporters who rally behind the vision of Flying Arts in both word and deed. 2017 has been a year of flying higher than we thought we could, to maintain our course in the face of fine weather and storms, to continue to build a better visual arts community for all Queenslanders.

CREATIVE COMMUNITIES AND SCHOOLS By Request Programs

WORKSHOPS AND PROJECTS

Our demand-driven touring program of By Request workshops and projects has been a cornerstone of Flying Arts Alliance for many years. The purpose and value of this part of our work is unquestionable, and cuts to the core of our aims as an organisation: to provide equitable and affordable access to high quality arts and cultural services across Queensland. In 2017, Flying Arts led a team of over 60 professional artists and facilitators to deliver workshops and projects across the state.

The demand for By Request workshops and projects increased again this year, signalling the ongoing importance of our role in connecting skilled professional artists with creative communities and schools. We have adapted to the changing needs of our clients.

Over 160 standard workshop and projects across the broad categories of visual arts, media arts, arts business and arts management were on offer to clients in 2017. Although all could be tailored to suit audiences of any age and skill level, we have seen a steady increase in requests for customised workshops and longer-term specialty projects that address specific community and participant needs. We welcomed the opportunity to work closely with organisers to achieve their desired outcomes.

Our booking numbers are a testament to our ability to meet the changing needs of our clients. In 2017, Flying Arts delivered 100 By Request workshops and projects across a total of 157 training days. In doing so, we visited over 45 unique locations spanning the state, from Far North Queensland to the South East, Central West, and everywhere in between. Workshop and project participants ranged from young children learning mask-making at Brisbane Festival's Arcadia, through to educators learning how to create inflatable art in Cairns. Client and participant feedback speaks to the high quality of our service and content delivery, with 93% rating their interactions with Flying Arts as good to excellent.

Our contracted artists and facilitators also provide feedback about their experiences in the field. Their response makes clear that the experience of teaching and sharing their craft can be as transformative to them as it can be for the communities in which they are engaged to teach. Just some of the incredible stories of engagement, collaboration and achievement are shared on the Flying Arts website as a record of our impact. 97% of our facilitators gave good to excellent ratings in post-engagement surveys.

While our artists and facilitators may visit a location for short periods of time, the skills, knowledge and ideas they impart stays with those communities and provides a catalyst for further creativity, skills building, and economic resilience.

The impact of these workshops and projects on the communities that book them and the participants that attend them cannot be underestimated. By embracing the spirit of adventure and taking to the skies when needed, Flying Arts will continue to provide opportunities for people to explore their creative and career potential right in their own back yards - ensuring access to a creative life for all Queenslanders, regardless of region.

INDIGENOUS ARTIST MENTORSHIP

Flying Arts was engaged by Access Arts to coordinate and deliver a mentorship program for Bert Smallwood, a talented Aboriginal painter. Respected arts professional and Flying Arts facilitator, John Armstrong, was engaged to mentor Bert in a flexible and highly specialised program that addressed his specific needs as an artist experiencing disadvantage.

Over the course of a six month mentorship, Bert gained a new appreciation for, and understanding of, future directions that are possible for him as an artist. He developed essential business skills with the aim of raising his profile as a professional artist. During the mentorship period, Bert's artwork was also displayed at the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts, resulting in several sales.

CURATOR BY REQUEST

Western Downs Regional Artists' Exhibition

Each year the committees of the major Art Galleries of the Western Downs plan and deliver the annual Western Downs Regional Artists' Exhibition. Flying Arts facilitator and curator, Lisa Beilby, was brought on board to be the external curator this year.

Beyond showcasing Western Downs artists to their community and tourists alike, the exhibition aimed to raise the profile of local artists beyond regional borders and provide opportunities for professional development. In addition to exhibition curation and coordination, Lisa delivered a two day intensive for local artists, imparting essential skills in developing, managing and promoting exhibitions. The intensive gave participants a well received boost in confidence and responded to the needs of their community.

31 local artists were ultimately selected for the exhibition, *On Show*. While some were fortunate enough to be awarded prizes, all artists involved walked away with their works immortalized in a quality printed publication, complete with curatorial essay.

Salvage: Recycling Art Exhibition

For the second year running, Flying Arts was contracted by the Brisbane City Council to assist in the installation of the *Salvage* exhibition resulting from their annual Recycling Art Competition. The competition explores the creative potential of reusing and recycling household items and furniture, resulting in unique and sometimes delicate works that must be handled and installed with care.

Our curator, Lisa Beilby, was more than up to the task. Due to Lisa's knowledge of the exhibition space, along with her expertise in volunteer coordination and exhibition installation, the process ran smoothly from start to finish. Artists and council representatives alike were thrilled with the professional result that showcased such unique works.





CREATIVE GENERATION

Education Queensland engaged Flying Arts once again to prepare and implement a program of visual arts workshops in regions around Queensland as a part of the Creative Generation Excellence Awards in Visual Art. Flying Arts arranged all logistics, from securing artists to arranging venues, travel, accommodation and materials for each workshop.

Flying Arts selected three unique workshop offerings that were delivered in selected regions across the state. 37 eager particpants took up the opportunity to develop specialised skills under the guidance of professional artists who are highly skilled in their respective fields.

Students welcomed the opportunity to engage with new materials and methods of making. They particularly appreciated the insight the artists were able to provide about their own artistic and career trajectories, including the paths they took towards becoming professional artists themselves.

QUEENSLAND ART TEACHERS ASSOCIATION CONFERENCE

In 2017, the Queensland Art Teachers Association engaged Flying Arts to develop and coordinate delivery of the conference program schedule for their annual conference, *Ignite*.

Over 120 arts educators, from aspiring teachers to experienced department heads, came together at the Queensland University of Technology to connect with their peers and reignite their passion for art education. Respected international artist, Julia Yonetani opened the conference with an inspirational keynote address. 20 panels, workshops, and facilitated discussions were presented by 24 professional artists, educators, and facilitators across the three-session program.

SMALL SCHOOLS PROGRAM

The Small Schools Program returned in 2017, addressing the need for equitable and affordable access to teacher skill development and delivery of arts-rich experiences in regional and remote primary schools with 50 or fewer students.

15 teaching staff participated in the program, developing their ability to blend art and non-art curriculum areas in stimulating lessons that encouraged participation and engaged the 95 students who took part.

Practical one-day incursions were delivered in schools, each with a diverse range of cross-curriculum links. Cross-overs between art and science were a popular request from teachers, resulting in students learning through activities such as:

- Making 'draw-bots' with simple circuits and battery power
- Eco-dyeing to demonstrate the principles of chemical science
- Using objects on sun-responsive paper to create prints and explore solar energy
- Dropping ink on paper from various heights and angles to better understand gravitational forces

Case studies with sample lesson plans from completed incursions were uploaded to the Flying Arts website to provide an enduring resource for teachers to access and build upon for delivery in their own classrooms. These resources, along with those developed in previous years, serve to further demonstrate how arts learning can be incorporated across the curriculum.

The Small Schools Program is an ongoing outcome of the Connecting Arts with School Curriculum research project and pilot program.

CONNECTING ARTS WITH SCHOOL CURRICULUM (CASC)

Connecting Arts with School Curriculum (CASC) aims to highlight the value and benefit of teacher and artist collaboration in the classroom particularly as it pertains to teaching that integrates and addresses both arts and non-arts curriculum. The current program has evolved from the original research project and pilot program conducted with the University of Southern Queensland in 2013.

A series of 5 Connecting Arts with School Curriculum seminars were delivered in regional centres across Queensland in 2017, providing essential skill-building and networking for 37 artists and teachers.

Primary and middle-school generalist teachers who may have lacked the confidence to deliver lessons with a strong arts focus have found the program most beneficial. All teachers walked away with implementable lesson plans developed over the course of the seminar. YOUNG ARTISTS Scheduled

Designed for students from years 9 - 12, the Flying Arts Artiz programs have continued to connect with young artists during a critical stage of their personal and artistic development. Beyond skill-building and career advice, each program also provides a supportive environment for students to find their artistic voice, connect with like-minded peers and develop new and lasting friendships. Artiz is an immersive experience that offers residential options for our regional participants.

The program continues to evolve in response to the changing needs of young artists and aspiring arts workers across the state. This year saw an exciting addition to the Artiz line-up, with a renewed focus on arts writing and publishing for students in their senior year.

Residential places were provided for all programs, to somewhat level the access for students from anywhere across Queensland. Thanks to generous support from Brian Tucker Accounting, 12 participants throughout the year received financial assistance to subsidise their travel from regional and remote Queensland.

ART ENQUIRER

Institute of Modern Art

12 - 13 May, 2017

This year, Flying Arts partnered with the Institute of Modern Art (IMA) for the first time to present *Art Enquirer*. The program welcomed 9 senior high school students from Queensland, (and one from Tasmania) to the Judith Wright Centre for an intensive focused on arts writing and publishing.

Across two full days, students took part in a cultural tour of Brisbane, including a tour to studios of prominent contemporary Queensland artists. They also reviewed exhibitions on display at the IMA, gained insight into the publishing process and benefited from a Critical Arts Writing workshop under the mentorship of IMA Senior Manager, Madeleine King.

Following the program, students submitted draft essays, which were professionally edited and redrafted for publication. Every student who took part in the whole program can now proudly state that they are a professionally published arts writer.

ARTIZ INNOVATIVE

The Edge, State Library of Queensland 28 - 30 June, 2017

Artiz Digital was rebranded to Artiz Innovative in 2017, in response to the widely varied means by which students would be able to engage with cutting-edge areas of contemporary art-making. Science, technology, electronics and art were brought together into a jam-packed program delivered over three days at The Edge, State Library of Queensland.

The 9 students who took part designed and cut acrylic printing plates to produce heat-responsive wallpaper, designed wearable technology, experimented with vegan leather produced from kombucha tea and created a number of 3D printed objects. Presentations by professional practicing artists also highlighted the variety of career-paths and opportunities students may have to extend their practice following high school.

ARTIZ PUBLIC

University of Southern Queensland

27 - 29 September, 2017

Taking place at the University of Southern Queensland, Toowoomba, Artiz Public saw 10 attendees dive into the street art program with enthusiasm, guided by experienced street artists.

Students first drew inspiration on a tour of murals created during the First Coat International Street Art Festival, then headed back to the university to learn skills in concept design and development. Their ultimate goal was to create a 30m x 3m mural on campus with aerosol and stencil techniques. A massive undertaking by all accounts, the students exceeded their own expectations and those of their facilitators, with their skill, talent and willingness to collaborate.

Students were particularly eager to learn the various career paths facilitators had taken to become professional artists with thriving practices.

The content of the workshop was excellent because of the balance between developing skills and gaining inspiration from practiced artists.

ARTIST CONSULTATIONS

Artist Consultations continue to be one of our most in-demand professional development offerings. These self-directed sessions tailored to artists' individual learning goals often book out well in advance. Two additional sessions were added to the line-up this year in response to artists' clear need to gain one-on-one insight, feedback and guidance from experienced arts professionals. 41 artists benefited from artist consultations in 2017.

WHERE TO NEXT...?

Mid-career artists were identified as a cohort with fewer opportunities than their emerging or established counterparts. In 2017, in partnership with the National Association for the Visual Arts (NAVA), Flying Arts established a free mid-career development program to address this, titled, *Where to Next...?* - A Mid-Career Development Intensive.

12 artists were selected to participate in a rigorous two-day program to assist their long-term career management and planning. They walked away with clearly defined goals, action plans and strategies to pave the way towards becoming well-established within the Queensland arts scene.

The success of this pilot program has paved the way for further partnership opportunities with the National Association for the Visual Arts in 2018.

EXHIBITION DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

In 2017, our popular Exhibition Development Program expanded to encompass a regional program in Cairns, providing greater opportunities for non-metropolitan artists to benefit from the program.

A new two-day intensive format provided greater scope for artists to absorb the wealth of information provided in a condensed time-frame compared to the extended format in previous years. The course addressed principles of planning, design and development of exhibitions and exhibition proposals.

6 eager artists took part in the Cairns program, and a fully suscribed 22 artists attended the Brisbane-based intensive.

Outcomes from the 2017 programs have been exceptional. The proactive artists who took part in Brisbane created their own informal collective to keep in touch and support each other following the program. Their enthusiasm and connection was inspiring. The group took strides towards developing a show together.

A space opened in the Flying Arts exhibition schedule. The self-directed steps they took towards producing an exhibition together meant that we could support them further.

19 artists who had originally taken part in the program in both Cairns and Brisbane brought their vision to life under the guidance of their mentor, John Armstrong. The resulting exhibition, *Beautiful One Day*, *Fruit Salad The Next!*, at the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts in Brisbane, was a resounding success.

Through our ongoing partnership with Queensland College of Art, two students attended the program, and Chrys Zantis received a solo exhibition opportunity at the Queensland College of Art galleries to exhibit her work in 2018.

QUEENSLAND REGIONAL ART AWARDS Iconic Queensland

Queensland is rich with iconic structures, people, locations, events and lifestyles that shape the State's identity. In 2017, artists were invited to consider the unique and iconic elements within their own regions, to produce works that reflect our diverse Queensland communities.

We received the highest number of entries in the history of the Queensland Regional Art Awards, with 228 artworks submitted. Entries hailed from as far north as Badu Island to Wallangarra, right next to the New South Wales border.

All eligible submitted artworks were displayed in a dedicated online gallery for People's Choice voting, and to provide exceptional exposure to participating artists. The gallery received 12,702 total page-views in the month it was on display. People's Choice voting also broke previous records, attracting a total of 1,769 eligible votes, signalling just how invested people are in the awards year after year.

29 artworks were chosen to tour metropolitan and regional Queensland in 2018.

It has created for not only myself, but also other associated artists, a conduit to reach a broader audience, igniting the opportunity to be involved in a greater Contemporary Art platform.

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EXHIBITIONS Brisbane and Touring

The Flying Arts annual touring and Brisbane-based exhibitions provide opportunities for regional and remote Queensland artists to gain exposure, audiences and opportunities. In 2017, the Flying Arts exhibition program attracted a total of 27,121 attendees and participants to admire and appreciate the works of 64 featured Queensland artists.

BRISBANE EXHIBITIONS

Flying Arts calls the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts home. Access to The Shopfront, a multipurpose space that can be utilised as an exhibition venue, has enabled the development of a robust exhibition program with the primary purpose of providing regional and remote artists with further exposure and connection to audiences outside their regions. Brisbane exhibitions attracted 10,620 attendees and participants in 2017.

This year, Flying Arts was notified that the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts would be undergoing renovations that would make The Shopfront space inaccessible for parts of 2018. This resulted in the development of an initiative to activate other spaces within the Centre, while also providing valuable exposure to the artists who are also our members.

Colours of Queensland

Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts 2 - 18 March, 2017 The Shopfront Gallery, Brisbane

Colours of Queensland, the touring exhibition of the 2016 Queensland Regional Art Awards, was officially launched in March. It was attended by an enthusiastic audience of 120 guests, supporters, sponsors and partners, as well as board and staff members. Invited guests enjoyed a floor talk of the exhibition facilitated by judge, Beata Batorowicz. They gained valuable insight into the artworks and the process by which they were selected this year.

15 of the 35 touring artists attended the launch, were celebrated for their achievements and witnessed first-hand responses to their work. The talent and skill of Queensland's regional and rural artists was affirmed by 7 sales enquiries by the end of the event.

Special guest speakers included Jennifer Howard MP, Assistant Minister of State representing the Premier; Simon Wright, QAGOMA Assistant Director - Learning and Public Engagement; and Karen Stephens, the winner of the Flying Arts 'Art for Life' Award in 2016.

Beautiful One Day, Fruit Salad the Next! was an exhibition of works from 19 talented artists, all of whom participated in Flying Arts's Exhibition Development Program. This cohort of artists had maintained ties following the program due to their enthusiasm for each others' work and perceived connections between their art practices. An opportunity arose to exhibit at the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts, so their plans for a group exhibition were expedited.

John Armstrong, who had originally facilitated the Exhibition Development Program to those participants, joined them once again to curate the exhibition. Over 50% of the exhibiting artists were from regional Queensland. 12 of the 19 artists attended the launch amidst 85 guests.

Beautiful One Day, Fruit Salad The Next! attracted a total of 1,625 visitors.

In 2017, a new initiative was trialled to activate the public foyer spaces of the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts and provide opportunities for Flying Arts members to exhibit their art in Brisbane.

TOURING EXHIBITIONS

Each year Flying Arts takes to the road to connect artists to new audiences and opportunities. In 2017, our touring exhibitions enriched 12 unique regional galleries and art centres, attracting a total of 12,966 attendees and participants.



Colours of Queensland

In 2016, Flying Arts' 45th year, the Queensland Regional Art Awards theme was 'Colours of Queensland'. Artists were asked to consider what brings colour, vibrancy and life to their local community or region, drawing on personal experiences and observations. The resulting touring exhibition, Colours of Queensland, went on the road in 2017 and was received extremely well in all tour locations. 36 works were selected by exhibition curator, Andrew Baker. It attracted a total audience of 3,085 across Brisbane and regional venues.

Reminiscence

Reminiscence: A Tribute to Judith Wright also continued its tour in 2017, visiting an additional four venues across regional Queensland. The exhibition features the works of artists Fiona Rafferty and Frances Smith, who worked collaboratively to produce works celebrating Queensland's own poet and activist Judith Wright.

This year, Flying Arts received an extension from the Playing Queensland Fund to enable the exhibition to tour to an additional venue in 2018.

In 2017 alone, Reminiscence attracted 3,098 gallery visitors and public programs presented in conjunction with the exhibition engaged a further 229 participants. To date, the exhibition has attracted a total of 10,512 visitors and 419 participants.

Grounded

In 2017, Grounded visited four regional locations, building upon its success since it started touring in 2015. The exhibition presents the outcome of two residencies by artist Judith Parrott: one in the Gaelic speaking Outer Hebrides of Scotland and the other with the Australian Aboriginal nations of the Central Australian desert and the plains of Western Queensland.

Grounded features photography, sound, audiovisual, language and prose; with inspiration drawn from landscape and stories shared by the local people. Judith's artistic interpretation addresses issues surrounding connection to land, language, and each other for environmental and personal wellbeing.

In 2017, the exhibition was attended by 5,800 exhibition visitors including 209 school students. To date the exhibition has attracted 10,805 visitors.
